Attorneys In Hardaway Damage Suit Express Confidence In Asheville Lawyer

Charlotte, Oct. 24 .-- A proposition from J. T. Swain, Asheville lawyer, to retire Marching Orders For Ministers as referee in the case of the Hardaway Construction Company against the Western Carolina Power Company in a suit to recover \$1,300,000, was inter cepted this morning when, as Mr. Swain opened the hearing after a lapse of ten days, attorneys for both sides 'nid upon table a statement indicating their confidence in his ability and their desire that he continue the hearing as official

The contemplated action of the refe ree was an aftermath of the attack made upon Governor Morrison a few days ago by former Judge Frank Cur-ter, attorney for J. T. Harris, Ridgecrest merchant, who was electrocuted Thursday for the murder of F. W. Monnish, Judge Carter made reference t the Governor's fermer connection with this lawsuit and the fact that J. E. Swain, who presecuted Harris when ! was on trial for his life, was later appointed referee in this hearing.

Mr. Swain's connection with the hear ing being held here and the Governor's former affiliation with counsel for the Hardaway Construction Company was referred to by Mr. Carter in his appeal to the people of the State to make for the commutation of the death sentence restrg upon his client. It was excless critics of Judge Carter concend, that the purpose in the mard of Harris' atterney was to involve the Governor and Referee Swain in what was suggested as a possible collusion.

Attorneys both for the Hardaway Construction Company and the Western Carolina Power Company felt that it would be proper for them to express to the referee at the resumption of the hearing their implicit confidence in his character as well as in his ability to sit in judgment on the evidence being taken in the case.

Vigorous Speech By Simmons. There was a vigorous speech made in the Senate today by Senator Sim mens in advocacy of an amendment offered by Senator Watson of Georgia that would tax incomes up to \$8,000 when earned by personal labor of body or mind at a less rate than such in omes are taxed when they are carned by investments of money. Senator Simmons called attention to the fact that the principle involved in this amendment was recognized by the shance committee in formulating the revenue bill of 1918, when that committee placed personal service corporations on the same footing as partner ships and relieved them of the excess profits tax. In reply to Senator Watwould be unworkable, Senator Simmone called attention to the fact that for years such system has been in satisfactory operation in Engiand. The North Carolina Senator asserted that the amendment offered by the Senator

from Georgia was entirely workable and practicable, as has been already demonstrated even by the treasury de-partment of the United States.
