

SWAIN OFFERS TO RETIRE FROM JOB

Attorneys in Hardaway Damage Suit Express Confidence in Asheville Lawyer

Charlotte, Oct. 24.—A proposition from J. T. Swain, Asheville lawyer, to retire as referee in the case of the Hardaway Construction Company against the Western Carolina Power Company in a suit to recover \$1,300,000, was intercepted this morning when, as Mr. Swain opened the hearing after a lapse of ten days, attorneys for both sides laid upon his table a statement indicating their confidence in his ability and their desire that he continue the hearing as official arbiter.

The contemplated action of the referee was an aftermath of the attack made upon Governor Morrison a few days ago by former Judge Frank Carter, attorney for J. T. Harris, Ridgecrest merchant, who was electrocuted Thursday for the murder of F. W. Moonish, Judge Carter made reference to the Governor's former connection with this lawsuit and the fact that J. E. Swain, who prosecuted Harris when he was on trial for his life, was later appointed referee in this hearing.

Mr. Swain's connection with the hearing being held here and the Governor's former affiliation with counsel for the Hardaway Construction Company was referred to by Mr. Carter in his appeal to the people of the State to excuse the commutation of the death sentence resting upon his client. It was asserted that the purpose in the mind of Harris of attorney was to involve the Governor and Referee Swain in what was suggested as a possible collusion.

Attorneys both for the Hardaway Construction Company and the Western Carolina Power Company felt that it would be proper for them to express to the referee at the resumption of the hearing their implicit confidence in his character as well as in his ability to sit in judgment on the evidence being taken in the case.

Officials intimated, however, that there was a strong possibility in their judgment that many of the members of other railroad labor organizations would join the members of the "Big Five" in the event they leave the service, regardless of their leaders' instructions to the contrary.
