

### EASTERN CHAMBER LAUNCHES PROGRAM

#### Commercial Organizations of Eastern Part of State Now Organized

Greenville, October 29.—With the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce, now a definite organization, plans are now being formed to make it felt as a strong force in the development of the commercial life of this section of the State. The chamber was organized at a meeting of commercial secretaries from Eastern Carolina at Goldsboro this week and another session will be held in the near future for the purpose of framing a constitution and by laws for submission to the board of directors for adoption.

The new organization, which includes all of the leading cities and towns in Eastern North Carolina in its territory, is headed by Dr. C. J. Ellen, of Greenville, who is also president of the Pitt County Chamber of Commerce. Dr. Ellen was unanimously named president of the new body at the Goldsboro session.

At the next meeting of the directors, two full-time officers will be elected and they will be given the job of strengthening the organization and promoting its interests on a large scale. One of the officers will be the vice-president and the other the secretary-treasurer. As these officials will have important duties, care will be taken in their selection. An advisory board will also be chosen, and each locality will have a representative on the body.

The territory included at present takes in thirty-nine counties east of and embracing the main line of the Atlantic Coast Line Railway.

The livestock industry is one of the big objectives which will be stressed, as well as other phases of diversified agriculture.

### SUNDAY SCHOOL WORKERS IN JOHNSTON ORGANIZE

Smithfield, Oct. 29.—Many Sunday school workers of Johnston County were in attendance at the County Sunday School convention held in the Methodist Church, Smithfield, on Thursday and Friday of this week. Sunday schools from all sections of the county were represented and much interest was shown in the meeting.

At the Thursday night session of the convention the Johnston county Sunday School association was organized. The leaders were enthusiastic, and felt that a forward step had been made in the Sunday School work of the county.

The State Sunday School association was represented in the meeting by D. W. Sims, general superintendent of the association, and Miss Flora Davis, assistant superintendent. Mr. Sims said that Johnston county was the 28th county in the State to be organized into a county Sunday School association, and that ten other counties are ready had dates arranged for conventions when organizations would be formed, which would bring the number of organized counties up to forty-eight.

The officers elected for Johnston county Sunday School association were: President, Sam J. Kirby, Smithfield; vice president, P. R. Johnson, Hudson; secretary-treasurer, Mrs. L. I. Royal, Smithfield. These officers together with some of the other leaders will have a meeting at an early date and appoint a president for each Township in the county.

### MRS. MUSE WINS CHILD'S CUSTODY

#### Attorneys For Hubert Blake, Father, Give Notice of Appeal

Habeas corpus proceedings brought by the mother, Mrs. M. D. Muse, for the custody of her daughter, Natalie Blake, alleged to have been wrongfully abducted by the divorced father, Hubert Blake, of Charlotte, came to an abrupt close yesterday afternoon when counsel for the respondent declined to put on evidence in acceptance of the burden to show why the mother should not have the custody of the child. Judge Bond immediately instructed that the order be drawn assigning the child to the custody of the mother. The respondents gave notice of appeal.

The petitioner, Mrs. M. D. Muse, was represented by Douglas & Douglas and Charles U. Harris, the respondents by Zeke Henderson, of Charlotte; Murray Allen and W. F. Evans.

According to the allegations set up in the complaint and answer, Natalie Blake, the eight-year-old daughter of Hubert Blake by his first wife, who was Miss Christine Poole, of Raleigh, has been in the sole custody of her mother since December, 1919, when Mrs. Blake secured a divorce from her husband in Mecklenburg county, alleging adultery. Prior to that time, it is claimed, they had joint control of the child. Blake later remarried, as did Mrs. Blake, the latter becoming Mrs. M. D. Muse.

During Fair Week, Blake while in Raleigh, with the consent of the child's mother, carried her to the fair and without notice to the mother removed the child to Charlotte Saturday upon his return.

Warrant charging abduction was issued, and Blake was brought back to Raleigh where habeas corpus proceedings were invoked to bring the child into the custody of the court.

A physician's certificate presented to the court yesterday showed the child was ill and could not be in attendance upon the court.

After the reading of the complaint and answer, in which Mrs. Muse set up her claim to the child, custody of which was not determined in the divorce proceedings in Charlotte, and in which the respondent alleged the mother and her present husband are not fit persons to retain custody, Judge Bond called upon
