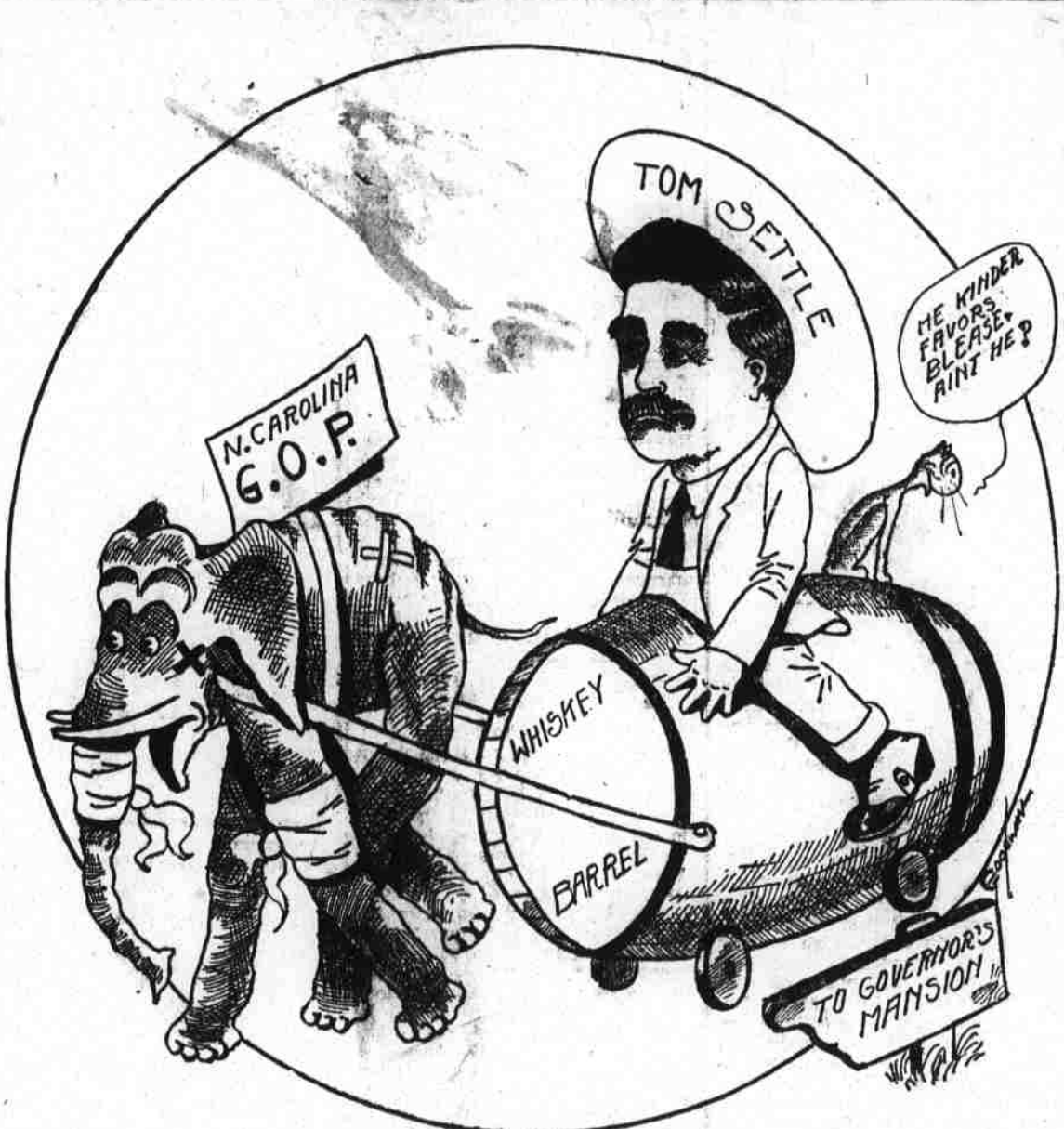

MODEL OF THE VANCE STATUE

Public Specially Invited to Inspect Model Monday Night in Capitol Rotunda

Mr. U. S. J. Dunbar, the sculptor of Washington, D. C., who is in the city with his model of the statue of Governor Vance, extends an invitation to the general public to view his work, and in order that they may do so with the least trouble, he has made arrangements to have the capitol open Monday evening from 8 until 9:30 o'clock.

Those who have seen it have been very favorably impressed with it. He is standing with a closed book in his left hand as if he had just finished reading some passage, and his right hand thrown out in a characteristic gesture suggests that he is explaining the same to the senate. In a close-buttoned frock coat without any crease in his trousers the pose and swing of the statue seems very true to life.

Mysterious Tunnel Found.

Boston, Sept. 14.—A mysterious tunnel just discovered under the street in Court Square is thought to have been made by prisoners attempting escape from jail cells three-quarters of a century ago in the old courthouse recently demolished to make way for a city hall annex.

EQUINOCTIAL STORM DAMAGE AT MOBILE

Mobile, Sept. 14.—The equinoctial storm that struck the gulf coast last night, threatening serious damage to Mobile, abated today. The small river steamer National was sunk this morning. The government dredge Barnard, which assisted in raising the battleship in Havana harbor, dragged or anchored for a quarter of a mile, but was not damaged. Cedar Street Methodist church was blown down and there was damage in other parts of the city.

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THE MILITARY FIRED UPON

Brisk Exchange of Shots Between Strikers and Guard—More Fighting

ZONE TO BE EXTENDED

Fighting Between Miners in Section Where Work is Going on and Where There is No Military Guard—Is Pay Day and Shot is Causing Trouble—Result of Bloody Encounter Not Known—No Damage in Encounter Between Troops and Strikers—Military Zone Will Be Extended.

Charleston, W. Va., Sept. 14.—The military outposts were fired on during the early hours today at Holly, in the heart of the territory under martial law, because of the miners' strike. The pickets replied, and the exchange of shots was brisk. Careful search of the wooded hillsides from which the shots came, showed the shots didn't take effect.

This is pay day in the unionist section of the north bank of the Kanawha river, where the men struck last week, but returned to work Tuesday. This marked the beginning of a riot at Hugheston. The fighting began at 9 o'clock; the shooting became general. It is reported that contending factions of miners were engaged in the fight. The result of the bloody encounter is unknown.

GEORGIA PEACH CROP

Bigger Portion of the Fruit Handled Went to Eastern Markets. Atlanta, Ga., Sept. 14.—The movement of peaches from the Georgia territory over the Southern railway for 1912, consisted of 5,334 cars, as compared with 4,822 cars in 1911, and \$26 in 1911, according to figures given out. Of this number 4,293 cars originated at points within the state of Georgia, the remainder coming from points in adjacent states, and being sent to market with the Georgia product. The total movement of peaches over all lines for 1912 is given as 7,139 cars.

WHITE SLAVE TRAFFIC

Cleveland Being Used as a Recruiting Station For White Slavers. Cleveland, Sept. 14.—Evidence that Cleveland is being used as a recruiting station for "white slaves" was discovered by Probation Officer Christian. Chief of Police Kohler ordered the entire police force to double their efforts to stamp out the evil. Christian reports there is an organized effort between handsomely gowned women, and well-dressed young men, waiters in restaurants and grills, and dance halls and moving picture show attaches, to procure girls frequenting those places. The police attribute the disappearance of twenty-three girls during the last two months to white slave traffic. They probably were taken to other cities.

Jack Sullivan Badly Fought. Sidney, Sept. 14.—An Australian heavyweight boxer named Saunders, outpointed Jack Sullivan, the American, in a 20-round bout. Sullivan was badly punished. The police stopped the bout in the 18th round.
