The School Law.

We are pleased to learn that the President of the Senate and Speaker of the House have decided to sign the school law which was passed by the late legislature, but was not signed before the adjournment, being overlooked in the rush of business.

A Novel Law.

The legislature of Tennessee has recently passed a law making it a misdemeanor, punishable with fine and imprisonment, for any person to sell or offer to sell or to bring into the State for the purpose of selling, giving away or otherwise disposing of belt or pocket pistols or revolvers, or any other kind of pistols except army or navy pistols.

Fees of County Officers.

The late legislature passed a law entitled "An Act to regulate the fees of certain county officers in Pitt county," but in the body of the Act it was not confined to Pitt county alone, and it was thought by many persons that the Act applied to the officers of all the counties.

An Ancient Debt.

A lady of this county has a common "poodle" dog, which is said to be forty years old. It is well known because it was raised in the family of its present owner. Within the past few weeks this old inhabitant has been peculiarly affected. Every morning when it would come out of the coop it would be unable to walk, but would "flap" about its legs seeming to be useless, but towards noon it would be all right, and walk about as usual.

The Tobacco Tax.

For many years past the tax on manufactured tobacco has been 24 cents a pound. Last winter Congress passed an Act reducing this tax to 16 cents, to take effect on the first day of May, so that on Thursday last there was an unusual stir and bustle in all tobacco manufacturing towns.

A Good Law.

The Governor of Massachusetts has signed the bill recently passed by the legislature of that State, which permits the recovery of damages resulting from the sale of liquor from the owner of the buildings wherein the liquor was sold. A law similar to this has been passed in several other States, and has made liquor dealers more careful to whom they sell their poisonous stuff.

An Amendment Needed.

We think there should be a law passed authorizing the Governor to appoint a temporary Judge to hold the Courts of any Judge who may be unable on account of sickness or other cause to hold them himself.

Barter Not Taxable.

Love Against Law.

EDITOR RECORD.—The accompanying poetical argument for Love was written over half a century ago, and is done so cleverly, that I send it to you for publication. It is no fancy sketch, and peculiar interest will attach to it, as it was written by one of North Carolina's most eminent men, the late Senator Haywood. The Haywood family, of Raleigh, has long been noted for talent, and for the commanding position it has occupied at our country. The author of these verses was the most talented and distinguished of even this family. He was graduated at the University of North Carolina, in 1810, at the early age of eighteen. He was soon called to the bar, and entered into a large and lucrative practice. He entered public life as a member of the House of Commons, in 1831, in which he served with eminent ability, for several terms. He was Speaker of the Body, in 1836. Was United States Senator from 1837 to 1846, when he resigned, and was succeeded by Mr. Redger. At that time, the Bar of the State was crowded with men of the very highest legal and literary attainments, and yet Mr. Haywood stood "FIRST AMONG HIS EQUALS." The manuscript is in a clear and beautiful hand, and is in a good state of preservation. The verses tell "a tale of the heart," which many who read will appreciate as true and drawn to the life. Let us not fit the veil on the "one who might seem to mortal eye a pure, unsexed being," and yet was one, who, "sorrow-bowed to wealth's control," and called forth the curse of the young barterer's withered heart. It is only justice to a noble lady to say that it was Miss Jane Graham, daughter of Edward Graham, whence the name of a son and grand-son, that "freshened the withered heart," and caused our hero to "kiss the captive chain," and "bless the gentle power that bound him." This love was radiant and burned quenchless 'till death dimmed its lustre.

The American Egg Trade.

The traffic in eggs in this country is estimated by competent authorities to equal \$180,000,000 a year. The hatched eggs produced yearly at New York reach over 500,000 barrels valued at \$9,000,000, and this is but one branch of the trade. It is said that Philadelphia consumes 80,000 dozen eggs a day. The receipts in Boston for the year 1878 were over 6,500,000 dozen. Between \$2,000 and 6,000,000 dozen are annually exported from the country. The millions of dozens consumed throughout the country without passing into dealer's hands is impossible to estimate.
