comes down perpendicularly into the lake. We mount another launch and pass through the Trossachs which is at the very foot of Ben Venue which towers up almost perpendicularly here with rough and rugged sides showing ruggedness. The road winds through the glen which is thickly wooded and covered with grass and a rank growth of ferns.

Salisbury Waterman: Mr. John Richwine, aged about 55 years, a native of Pennsylvania, but since the war a resident of this place, left here on Friday the 18th instant, and went into the woods and hanged himself. He was a soldier in the Federal army and was entitled to a pension, and the preliminary papers for drawing \$2,500 reached the Post Office in this place on Saturday, the next day after the disappearance. But it appeared that he was in possession when he had at hand on the fatal day, which may have been the cause of his self destruction.

At noon Times: A gentleman in this county has twenty-nine children. — One day last week Miss Mattie Williams, the 10 year old daughter of Mr. Henry Williams of Wadesboro, met with a fatal accident in Cabarrus county. She was on a visit to relatives and went out on Wednesday to Mr. Williams' mill, which was near by. While in the mill she pushed her hand upon a shaft that was rapidly revolving, and finding it warm, she took her apron and placed the end of it upon the shaft. By some means her apron got caught in the shaft and also her clothing, and she was whirled around at a fearful rate. She was killed almost instantly, and her body was terribly mangled, and most of her bones broken. A free aid could be rendered her.
