We would call the attention of our fruit-growers to the following letter that we have received from the president of the "Fruit Growers' Association," and hope they may adopt the suggestions therein contained: "Mr. H. A. LINDLEY, Pres. My Dear Sir:—Chatham is one of our best fruit-growing counties, and ought to come to the front rank. Can you induce the people to collect good specimens of green, dried, evaporated and preserved fruit, &c., and exhibit them at the State Fair? I think some of the counties will make special Fruit and Floral exhibits, including natural and artificial arrangements, &c., such as the Index of your county so well understood and appreciated. Now, if three or four citizens of your county could be induced to make a display and conduct the exhibition for the county, much good would be accomplished and no one would ever regret it. Mr. P. M. Wilson, of Raleigh, is corresponding secretary of the Fruit Growers' Association and will attend to procuring space for your county exhibit. I leave the liberty of writing to you in regard to it because I know you take a great interest in whatever concerns the advancement of our county.
