An Old Sinner.—Mr. Edward Finch, of this county, has a silver teaspoon that is older than any we have yet heard of. It bears the date of 1672 and has on it the initials "A. T. F.", having belonged to one Mr. Fanell's ancestors and has been handed down from father to son for over two hundred years.

Marriage Licenses.—During the past month business has greatly improved in the matter of issuing marriage licenses, the number being 12, whereas in August there were only 4. Judging from the number of young couples casting soft glances at one another at the Association last week, we should say that our obliging Register will soon be called upon for more licenses.

Our Court House.—No citizen of this county, who attended the late term of our court, or the Baptist Association, will now regret the tax that he pays for building our new court-house. At court, jurors, witnesses, suitors and hundreds of spectators were comfortably seated, instead of standing all day as was the case in our old court room. On account of the immense crowd in attendance at the Association last week the sessions of that body were held in the court room, which was admirably adapted for that purpose, and men, who before were grumbling at the erection of that edifice, were then delighted that it had been built.

The Association.—The Baptist Association that was held here last week will long be remembered. It was the first that had been held here in thirty years, but we hope it will not be so long an interval before another is held here. It was a most pleasant occasion, the attendance was very large, the weather favorable, and everything passed off harmoniously and happily. On Sunday the attendance was particularly large, making our streets look like "Frisby in Court week."
