

THE LEGISLATURE.

The General Assembly of the State of North Carolina convened yesterday in the Capitol at Raleigh, and was duly organized in both branches. The attendance of the members elect was unusually large for the first day of the session, there being forty-five Senators and one hundred and eight representatives present.

The House was organized by the election of GEORGE M. NELL, Rose, of Cumberland, as Speaker, and Col. John D. Cameron as Clerk. The other officers will be elected to-day. Mr. Rose was so eminently qualified for the position of Speaker that we do not see how the House could have done otherwise than elect him.

The various committees will be appointed in a day or two, and then everybody will get to work. We hope they will not attempt to do too much. We have greater cause to fear too much rather than too little legislation.
