There has been some excitement around here about mad dogs, but they are not as plenty as talk is, or it would be very dangerous to travel.

I am glad to say that the citizens around Gravel Spring are building a Friends church in about a mile of the office, near the family grave yard at Mr. John Whitehead's. It is a very nice church house and is located where there has been need of one many years. T. H.
