A Destructive Flood.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., April 10.—The Tombigbee, at Columbus, Miss., is seven feet higher than ever known before, and the country surrounding it is under water.

Wires have been down for several days until this evening, when one wire was got in order. Twenty people have been drowned and there are over six hundred refugees in Columbus a charge upon the community. Much live stock has been drowned and the property loss is heavy.

THE GREAT rise in the Mississippi now threatens to result in one of the most disastrous of the many floods that devastated the adjacent country. This city is threatened with complete destruction. Already 625 people have been drowned and one thousand houses have been demolished here and in this vicinity.

MUCH damage to farms and great destruction of live stock is reported from the surrounding country. Nashville, Tenn., April 12.—The horrible loss of life across the Mississippi State line grows more appalling and the death list is constantly increasing. The waters now cover the land for twenty miles south of here. Scores of houses, bodies of men, women and children, together with those of beasts, maddly the waves. Over 1,200 people are homeless.
