—RAIN, HAIL AND WIND.—On last Sunday evening the sky in this section became overcast with dark and lowering clouds and between four and five o'clock a heavy rain storm, accompanied by a high wind, a hail burst forth in its fury, doing much damage to growing crops, &c. The storm concentrated and centered at near Banks Chapel, about four miles east of Pittsboro, where its work of destruction began, plowing its way to Jones' Grove, a distance of about eight miles. Wheat and oats, particularly suffered heavily. At Mrs. Margaret Cooper's the wind down pines were broken out, others killed, besides the damage done to her crops. At Mr. John Bennett's the hail was very destructive, overthrowing his entire crop. We learned our informant stated that Mr. Bennett was preparing to plant cotton over, and we supposed he had done so already. One informant stated that after the storm was over that hard stones in drifts had represented Jones' Grove. And a person told us that the track of the storm could be easily followed by the destruction done to everything in its path, even the trees and bushes being stripped of their leaves, the plants twisted where ten or twelve yards had been torn up. Hard stones were picked up this morning, some 12 or 14 lbs. each, and the storm was over in the vicinity of Farrell's yard. Corn was damaged considerably, but not wholly, and will come out fruitfully. The storm was of short duration and the territory covered by not more than a half mile wide.
