**A SUDDEN DEATH.**—Mr. B. F.  
Hodden of Hickory Mountain town-  
ship, died very suddenly on last  
Monday night. He and some of his  
neighbors, on a trip to Raleigh with  
their wagons, camped on last Mon-  
day night near Mr. James Burros,  
about five miles south of this place,  
and he seemed to be in high-  
health. Before they all went to sleep,  
Mr. Hodden was missing, and  
searching made him way down along  
the ground near the camp.

The cause of his sudden death is  
supposed to have been heart disease.

Mr. Hodden was about 48 years  
old, was a son of the late Dr. J. B.  
Hodden, and was a most highly  
esteemed citizen, quiet in his man-  
ners, temperate in his habits and  
upright in his dealings.

Stock Law Election.—In accord-  
ance with a petition for that purpose,  
the county commissioners have or-  
dered an election to be held at Mons-  
eau, on the 12th day of April, to  
determine the question of establish-  
ing the stock law in the following  
territory: beginning on Haw river,  
at the line fence between Mrs. L. H.  
Gibbons and A. Moore, following said  
line west to their outside fence,  
thence south with Mrs. Gibbons'  
outside fence to near the Woman-  
place, thence west to the corner of  
Mrs. Glover's fence, thence west  
with her fence to J. H. Wiss-  
ler's fence, thence in a westerly di-  
rection with said Wissler's outside  
fence across the Pittsboro railroad  
at the corner of his fence, thence  
south parallel with the Pittsboro  
railroad to near the R. & A. L.  
said railroad to Mrs. Sarah E. Jones'  
fence on railroad near Gold Mine  
branch culvert, thence with Mrs.  
Jones' fence to the Deep river com-  
pany's fence, thence with the  
said fence to the stone lock at the  
mouth of the canal at Lockville,  
thence down Deep river to its jun-  
ction with Haw river, and thence up  
Haw river to the beginning.

Mr. B. G. Wimble has been ap-  
pointed registrar, and John Brady,  
John Brinkley, W. B. Wilkie and B.  
H. H. H. Utley have been appointed poll  
holders for said election.

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
