The Establishment of State banks of issue now seems probable, and if such banks are established we think they will be of greater benefit to the people of North Carolina than the passage of any free silver bill. A caucus of the democratic representatives in Congress was called to meet on last Tuesday night in order that the matter might be fully discussed and a proper bill prepared. At this writing we have not heard the result of that caucus, but it is confidently believed that a satisfactory bill can be secured and passed. It is very gratifying and encouraging to know that it is favored by the President and that the influence of the Administration will be exercised in its favor.

As our readers are aware, the notes of State banks were the only paper currency that was in circulation before the war. As a result now, the National Banking Act was passed in 1862, and then United States Treasury notes and National Bank notes became the only paper currency. The notes issued by the old State banks were withdrawn from circulation, and their further issue ceased, besides Congress levied a tax of ten per cent upon them, which of course was prohibitive. This was done to prevent State banks from competing with the new national banks, and thus give the latter a complete monopoly.

The proposition now is to repeal this prohibitory tax of ten per cent on State banks of issue, and thus allow the proprietors of such banks the opportunity of establishing their local banks or banks, which issue all the paper money that can be needed. This establishment of State banks will give the opportunity to have two good banks, one that will issue the currency, and one that will issue the paper money, and thus give the financial stability and restore the opportunity to have two good banks in competition with the national banks and break up this monopoly.

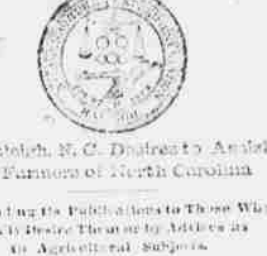
