Summon Corner—All the cases that were ready for trial having been disposed of by Friday afternoon, court was adjourned and the judge left here next morning.

In the criminal cases published in last week's issue, the following also were disposed of:

Suite against Dan Headen, for very verdict of guilty and sentenced to four months in public roads.

Suite against Bill Taylor, carrying concealed weapon, guilty and sentenced 30 days in public roads.

Suite against Azelius Laney, for larceny, guilty and sentenced to penitentiary two years.

Suite against Bill Williams, assault with deadly weapon, guilty and sentenced 30 days in public roads.

Suite against Duke Gilmore, assault with deadly weapon, guilty and sentenced 30 days in public roads.

Suite against Jim Harris, breaking and entering, guilty and sentenced 30 days in public roads.

Suite against William Adkins, assault and battery, guilty and fined \$5 and costs.

Suite against James Lawler and John Reddington, breaking into Bynum & Paschall's store at Goldston, guilty and sentenced to penitentiary, Lawler for 18 months and Reddington for 12 months.

The civil case due was taken up on Thursday, and only three cases were tried by a jury, to wit:

V. R. Stoyler against F. M. Farrell and others for foreclosure of a mortgage judgment for defendant because of the statute of limitations appeal.

Henry Cotten against Julia Cotton, action for divorce; judgment for plaintiff and divorce granted.

B. N. Gilmore against C. F. & V. R. R. Company, action for damages; his honor having intimated an opinion that the plaintiff was guilty of contributory negligence an appeal was taken to the Supreme Court.
