So far as we can now learn, the first instance of the people of North Carolina electing a Roman Catholic to any State office and therefore may be marked as a new departure or as a new step in the progress of our country.

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Cotton and Wheat Prices. Raleigh, Nov. 12.—With cotton at five cents a pound and wheat at 55 cents a bushel we are confronted with a serious problem. There are lands on which these crops are profitable. It is bound to be the object of the people that have been converted into pork, cheap wheat, there is no more to be had. But if the prices of agricultural supplies are actually low, we will not pay the farmers for their toll, their contribution will be a real thing at a calamity. The wealth of the country is ultimately depending on the soil and the weather, and the price of the soil is determined by the price of the wheat.

On the other hand, every dollar the farmer gets buys more than that in any form of money. Machinery, improved processes, planters, money and the extension of transportation facilities to the farmer, the price that the farmer must pay for his seed every year is determined by the price of the wheat.

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
