COUNTY LINE.—The last Legislature passed an act to run and ascertain the true and correct line between Alamance and Chatham counties, about which there has been some dispute. Mr. John Coble, of Alamance, and Mr. W. A. Lineberry, of Chatham, were appointed the commissioners to have the survey made, and Mr. H. H. Siler is the surveyor appointed for this county. They met at Hillsboro on last Tuesday and began their survey from that place, as the Chatham line is 16 miles due south from that town and then runs due west.

EASTER MONDAY.—More persons in this section observe Easter Monday than Easter day (Sunday) itself. It is a general holiday, usually spent in picnics and fishing frolics. Before the war it was a holiday even with the slaves, and since emancipation nearly every colored man, woman and child goes fishing on Easter Monday. We hope that the weather next Monday will be pleasant and favorable, so that all who go on a picnic or fishing will enjoy the day. Every mill pond in Chatham, on that day, will be thronged with eager fishermen, women and children, and no doubt many wonderful fish stories will be told.

A FLOOD.—The heaviest rain ever known here fell at this place, on last Sunday night. It was a perfect flood, "gully-washer and trash mover," and the creeks in this vicinity were higher than the oldest inhabitant remembers ever having seen. Rivererson's creek was like a big river, in some places two or three hundred yards wide, and in its bed Sheriff Spence Taylor's field it was a vast expanse of water, resembling a lake. Nearly all the dam at Moore's mill (in the edge of town) was washed away, and the mill itself was in great danger. Even "the little creek," that runs through town, was a raging torrent, rising high enough to reach Mr. Nat. Hill's stable, and carried down the stream, several hundred yards, three vehicles that had been standing in his stable lot!

CONFEDERATE MONUMENT.—A large crowd will go from this county to Raleigh, on the 20th of May, to witness the unveiling of the grand monument erected there to commemorate our Confederate dead. We are promised by the railroad authorities that a special train will be run that day on the Raleigh & Augusta railroad, which will arrive at Raleigh at 10 o'clock a.m. and leave there at 6 p.m., and a special train will be run on the Pittsboro road to coincide with that train at Monroe, leaving here about 8 o'clock a.m. This schedule will give visitors eight hours in Raleigh, which will be ample time to see everything. The railroad fare will be greatly reduced, possibly to one cent a mile, so that the trip will not cost much.

The monument is now completed and is a grand sight. On top of the shaft, at a height of about 65 feet, stands the bronze figure (made entirely of a Confederate soldier, clad and mounted in a most lifelike manner). A sight of it will recall to every old soldier feelings mingled pride and sadness, as recollection of a sad and yet glorious expression to feelings that had to find means of utterance.

Prince Bismarck was visited yesterday by a large delegation of public men from Berlin and the ceremonies were most affecting. In response to the ovation he received he made his speech which was eloquent because of its sincerity and the solemnity of the occasion.

In referring to his past career, especially to the elder Emperor Wilhelm and his Paladins, the old man of blood and iron, as the German family call him, was so filled with emotion that he broke down and wept, and it is said that in his whole audience there was scarcely one who was not in like manner affected. Bismarck is especially popular among the students and the grand finale to these celebrations will be an immense concourse of students who will assemble at Field's inculcating on the 20th of April, a fitting tribute to a man who in contributing so much to the intellectual strength of his country laid the foundation of its external greatness and success.

It is a sad reflection, but none the less true, that Bismarck is almost the only survivor among the great statesmen who have adorned this century. It seems that in the advanced age that he has attained he has almost overcome nature itself; but this, we know, transcends his powers. He stands alone as a great tree in a once numerous forest that has seen its comrades pass slowly away, and soon must in like manner depart leaving behind that will forever be a landmark in History. We are now confronted with other issues equally as grave those he has solved and the future appears dark and uncertain. Among the undergrowth that is springing up after him will there be another who will so distinguish himself among the rest or must the world be content to plod along in the beaten paths of mediocrity?

MOUNT AIRY NEWS: Mr. Arthur Blodooe, an old man aged 75 years, met with a horrible death at Mr. Russell Key's saw mill, on Saturday last. His left arm was cut entirely off and a gash cut in his left side at least a foot long, extending from the shoulder diagonally across to the pit of his stomach. Goldsboro Argus: Three special sleeping cars, containing 93 passengers, passed through this city over the Atlantic Coast Line yesterday afternoon en route for Mt. Olive, and thence for the sound section near Winston. These gentlemen are farmers from California, Colorado, Illinois and other contiguous States in that bleak and storm and drought-ridden section who have come South for the purpose of viewing our country, studying its climate and soil and informing themselves of its resources with the view of locating among us making their homes here and leading their experience, energy and means to the development of our lands and the advancement of our section.

SECT. 3. That any person violating this act shall be subject to a fine of not less than two dollars and fifty cents \$2.50 nor more than five dollars \$5. Said fine to go to the school fund of the county.

SECT. 4. That this act shall be in force from and after its ratification.

Until our citizens can get the Supreme court to construe the above law there will exist great doubt as to its meaning, for if it means what it says (as it reads) our good old county will be depopulated and there will be no need of providing a school fund, for there will be no children to educate!

It will be seen that section 1 allows certain hogs, sheep and goats six months, and section 2 allows certain cattle two years, but section 3 does not mention what time is allowed "Persons", and it is left in doubt whether they are allowed six months, like goats, hogs and sheep, or are allowed two years like male cattle. If they are allowed two years, then there is some hope for them for they may get the next legislature to come to their rescue by repealing this wonderful law!
