—A SHERIFF'S SWINDLER.—At the last term of the Federal court, held at Raleigh in May, a large number of persons from this county were indicted for violations of the revenue laws. A man named Welch, from Wake county, made the receipts of some of our Chatham merchants, and swindled several by a shrewd trick. He pretended to be the agent of a respectable lawyer who would secure their acquittal for a fee of only \$250. Accordingly several paid Welch this sum, and next day he came back to them and told them that the lawyer could not have \$250 more from each one, and with that sum their acquittal was sure. Some of them paid the additional \$250 and that was the last they saw of Welch, who pocketed their money and left for home. He was afterwards arrested and is to be tried this week at Wake county court for obtaining money under false pretenses, and on last Monday deputy sheriff M. M. Farrell carried to Raleigh from our county a man in prison, named Louie Womack, who had been convicted at the Federal court of "moonshining" and sentenced to our county jail for six months. He had been one of Welch's swindlers, having paid him \$5, and was carried to Raleigh to be used as a witness against him.

—COMMISSIONER'S MEETING.—As requested by the county commissioners held a meeting on last Monday for the purpose of revising the tax lists and hearing the complaints of any tax payers who might object to the valuation of their property. Only a few persons made complaint and still fewer changes were made. The valuation of property generally throughout the county is somewhat lower than heretofore.

Moore County Fruit.

MANLY, N. C., July 8, 1895.

Mr. Editor: There has been very few loads of peaches, blackberries, and plums shipped from Southern Pines and vicinity by the American Refrigerator Transit Company, and as many by the Southern Express Company, aggregating 6,000 crates. At \$2.00 per crate, and this is a very low estimate, it amounts to quite a little sum. These shipments began on the 21st of June, and will continue for two weeks more.

This fruit, it is said, is superior in quality and flavor to any produced in the South.

What would you think of three plums weighing one pound, and one dozen blackberries filling a quart measure? I am told that this was true. A bunch of Niagara grapes grew in the above vineyard that weighed 47 lbs. last year, and they will be again in 1895 because that will exceed it.

This article received a very special article in the paper, I saw a premium for the heaviest bunch of Niagara grapes produced last year.

Perhaps some of my Chatham friends would like to know the prices some of this fruit brings. Blackberries have sold from 10 cents to 14 cents per quart, plums 10 cents to 14 cents per quart, peaches \$1.50 to \$2.50 per 25 lbs. basket, crates in New York.

Grapes brought last season from 10 to 22 cents per pound, and now there is a good crop North this year, in most all kinds of fruit, it is expected that grapes will bring a fancy price.

The fruit and real estate business is on a boom here. Land valued at \$5 in the acre is less than that many years ago. Real estate men are asking \$5000 per acre that not more than two years ago 50 cents per acre.

The Van Dredley Orchard Co. have 200 acres in peaches and will clear 200 more this fall and winter. Dr. Van Herff, of Washington, D. C., with my friend D. D. F. Gougeon as superintendent, has been clearing out a planting to fruit a grand money maker.

Dr. Van Herff with the German Rail Works are putting on a grand many acres in sweet corn kinds of fruit in order to get the best varieties, made of fertilizing and irrigation.

Restrictive Storms.

CHATHAM, July 8.—Terrible heat, succeeded by terrific storms, were prevalent throughout the northern portion of the State yesterday. At Raleigh the thermometer was 77 degrees last evening. A heavy and storm visited that section during much of the day.

GREENSBORO, N. C., July 8.—A terrific hailstorm and water-pouring current of late yesterday, doing great damage to crops, washing away bridges, breaking hundreds of windows, and wrecking several houses. In many places the hail was as large as a hen's egg, and injured live stock.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., July 8.—A special from Richmond, Mo., says that a lightning bolt struck the town of Lynn Creek, the county seat of Camden, Sunday evening, and the entire town is under water.

The citizens were compelled to leave their homes and seek for the hills. The town is located in a valley, half a mile from the river, and the water from that stream is backed up into the town, while Lynn Creek and several smaller streams are pouring in upon the deserted village. It is thought that no lives have been lost, but this is by no means certain.

Fatal Fireworks.

LA SALLE, Ill., July 5.—The annual celebration here yesterday had a sad ending last night, and one man was dead and two others seriously injured as the result of an accident during the fireworks display.

A bomb rocket was sent up, but after going a short distance fell and exploded, setting fire to a large quantity of fireworks which exploded with terrific force. There were 6000 people within a block of the place at the time, and a terrible panic followed. A horse ran away, and the crowd stampeded, crushing women and children under foot.

One hundred persons were more or less seriously injured.

A Restrictive Flood.

SPRINGFIELD, Mass., July 6.—Thirty houses were washed away and ten people killed by a flood at Winoona, Mo., on the Current branch of the Memphis Railroad. There are many other washouts along the branch.

Winoona has 700 inhabitants, and is the county seat for Shannon county. Mayor Evans telegraphed here for help.

North Carolina Telephone Co.

RALEIGH, July 6.—The North Carolina Telephone Company has been organized, with L. H. Carr, of Durham, president. Three thousand miles of wire has been ordered, and Wilmington, Winston, Raleigh, Greensboro, Durham, Greensboro and Charlotte will be connected. It is intended eventually to include all the principal towns in North Carolina in this long distance system.

A Steamer Struck.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., July 6.—The steamer Lady Lou, which left Memphis at 5 P. M., struck a reef off Island No. 60 at 8 P. M. and sank within three minutes. A score of passengers are supposed to have been drowned. Seven dead have been recovered. Two of the missing were members of the crew, others were passengers.
