COVERING SEED TOO DEEPLY.

As improved impliment for cultivating the soil enable farmers to get it in better tilth, there is a constant tendency to plant too deeply. This to some extent offsets the advantage from better cultivation. Where grain is drilled the drill wheels sink more deeply into the finely-pulverized seed bod, and this lowers the tubes from which the seed is distributed. The roller to compact the surface cought to precede the drill in such cases, and even then the drill tubes should be raised as neuch as possible. - Boston Cultivator.

The church belts tolled contransually the theatre and shops were eleved, flags were hung at half most and the street lamps lighted and draged with crape. The whole of the inhabitants, how ever treated the occasion as a fete day and appeared in their gayest colors. The fit sent to session started from the eatherical at 8:39 a. m.

Three-tan land bearers with charch standard officers proceded it, followed by about a dozen church beadles hold ing belief other lanteres.
