Greenville Re-Entry: In the yard of Mr. John Panagan, of Farnville township, is a mysterious opening in the ground. It is a large crack in the earth, running from north to south, and is about ten feet long. It is large enough to run a tobacco sack in the crevice. It has been there more than a year. It disappears when the rain falls, it will not reappear, and as soon as the earth dries again it appears, each time more distinctly than the last. It is supposed to be caused by the earth's sinking a few years ago, which was so serious in many portions of the South. Some of the superstitions are very greatly alarmed, fearing there is about to be a break and separation of the earth in that portion of the world, and they don't know whether they will be on the other side or not. It is something to cause scientific investigation and quiet the fears of the people in that section.

The Armenian Massacres. CONSTITUTIONAL, Oct. 17.—According to the latest information received from Constantinople, Armenia, 400 persons were killed during the recent massacres. The Grand Vizier Kiamal Pasha has issued an order directing the Government of Trebizond to be responsible for all loss of life hereafter through political or religious disturbances.

Proposed of the Sultan to the Russian Ambassador A. J. Dard, because the recall of the order for a Russian garrison to go to Trebizond, has provoked the Armenians and Russian soldiers are taking numbers of Armenian refugees from Constantinople. The report of a riot at Trebizond in the vicinity of Adana, on the Anatolian Railway, during which Armenian were killed on October 17, a market day, by a Moslem mob, is confirmed. The Turkish government has ordered the Armenian work-revellers and knives, and the market and massacre of the Armenians, Christians, afterwards the Turkish soldiers into the streets. Several bodies have already been buried in the presence of the Armenian Bishop of Adana.

Reports received here from various sources of Anatolia say that the Armenians have been deprived of their weapons and that the latter have been taken to Massinians. In addition, in the district of Kharpuz, quantities of arms have been seized by the Turks. When the Sultan's army was questioned on the subject he said that the Armenians were quiet in their habitations and in their.

Real Estate.—The celebrated Turk, who was arrested recently charged with being the author of the plot in favor of Armenia, which was posted at Stamford some time previous to his being taken into custody, has according to the official announcement, died in the York prison, where he was confined, while awaiting trial.

An Insane Murderer. WASHINGTON, Oct. 19.—Reed, 38 years old, aged thirty five, in coming from a public house in New York, had with a club beat his wife to death. The Sheriff was called to attend the murderer. After his arrival Reed received a gun and opened fire on him.

Sheriff Wolsey was struck on the head by the shot, the bullet passed on, striking a woman named Barber, who will die from her injuries. Reed escaped and has not yet been captured.

Girls Burned by a Gas Explosion. New York, Oct. 18.—Several girls were seriously burned this morning by an explosion of a gas stove in a downtown printing house. The stove was in the dressing room where the girls were preparing for work. The door was locked but an automatic sprinkler flooded the apartment and extinguished the flames.

Destructive Snowstorm. Emp, Pa., Oct. 20.—A gale from the southwest which struck this section yesterday had a snowstorm with it, the worst ever known in this section so early in the year. The snow has been falling incessantly since 5 o'clock a. m., and at 9 o'clock p. m. it was ten inches on the level.
