A MAGNETIC SURVEY.—We would call the attention of our county commissioners to the importance of the suggestion made in another column by Prof. J. A. Holmes, the State Geologist, in regard to making a magnetic survey for this county. That such a survey is highly important must be admitted by every intelligent person, who reads Prof. Holmes' recommendation, and the expense of making it just now will be much less than at any other time. We hear that several counties will act upon Prof. Holmes' suggestion, and we hope that Chatham will follow their good example.

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The Earth's Magnetism in N. C. HOW IT VARIES.—A MAGNETIC SURVEY NEEDED.—NO ACCURATE FORMULARIES WITHIN.—OF COST.

The earth's magnetism is one of those mysterious forces in the world, the nature of which nobody has been able to explain to the satisfaction of other people, for like other of these mysterious forces, man's knowledge of it is limited to the practical affairs of his day, and the magnetic compass, the barograph, the telegraph, and in many other ways, is daily venturing upon them without having any scientific knowledge of its nature or its causes.

It is well known that the magnetic force varies in intensity, and it is well known that the magnetic force varies in direction, and it is well known that the magnetic force varies in its effects upon the human mind.

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be made in that region in order to determine the character and extent of these variations. After this has been done the magnetic map can then be revised and the location of the curved lines as well as the straight lines can be indicated in each county.

Then, there need only be made in the future, at intervals, observations at a few points like Newbern, Raleigh, Charlotte and Asheville, to determine the rate of variation from year to year, but this later work could be readily done by the general government without cost to the state.

As to the cost of such a magnetic survey, it is estimated that about \$500 per county will be required, and that the cost of the survey will be about \$100,000 for the whole state.
