DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION.—Yea, it is decidedly cloudy to put it mildly, for certain Populist office-holders and office-seekers in Chatham to be criticizing and censuring the Democratic State convention for declining the Populist proposition for co-operation.

Why?

Because in their county convention, held here on the first Monday in May, they voted against and-tabled by a majority of more than two to one the resolutions which proposed such co-operation.

Yes, in the Populist county convention, held here on the 2nd day of last May, Mr. W. C. Pearson introduced the following resolutions:

"Whereas, The People's party has from its iniquity stood for the free coinage of gold and silver without discrimination and against monopoly and allied trusts, and whereas we believe in union there is strength, therefore

Resolved First, That we heartily endorse the policy as outlined by Butler, Jones and Towne.

Second, That we instruct our delegates to the State convention to use their best endeavors to carry out the same."

These resolutions were earnestly urged by Mr. Pearson, who declared that the Populists are divided into two factions—one faction standing up for principles and the other eager to get up at the sacrifice of principle—and the eloquently called on those who were standing up for principles to vote for his resolutions. But, after an exciting and animated debate, the resolutions were ignominiously buried by a vote of 97 to 102!

And yet, after defeating the above resolutions, certain Chatham Populists are trying to create political capital out of the refusal of the Democratic State convention to allow Butler to dictate the terms on which the Democratic and Populist parties might co-operate in North Carolina.

HASNA FACTION BEATEN.

Cleveland, June 18.—There was a riot in the Republican county convention today as a result of the bitter contest between the McKinney and the Hanna factions, and but for the presence of a large force of police there would doubtless have been bloodshed. The Hanna faction was beaten at every point.

Before the convention assembled each faction claimed a majority of the delegates. The Hanna Committee of 300 was in charge of the arrangements for the convention, and S. T. Everett, chairman of the committee, was put forward as the leader of the Hanna faction.

The archbishop of Manila has assumed a pastoral in which he declares: "Very soon the country will see an insurmountable barrier placed between you and your masters. There will be then for you no situation nor representation, nor can you even participate in the government of the towns. You will be reduced to a separate civil state, vilified and degraded like those of the lowest caste and like miserable laborers reduced to the condition of the coolies, and, further, to that of beasts or machines supplied or fed by a handful of rice thrown in your faces as a daily allowance simply to secure the fruits of your labors. This is not all. The worst is that you will see the ruin of your temples, or that they will be turned into Protestant chapels, where there is no altar. Oh, this is hard, God, Virgin and all are gone, and the Cross will have disappeared from your cemeteries, the crucifix from your schools and the ministers of the true God who made you Christians through baptism."

Finally, at the command of Major McAllister, it is said, the police forced Collier from the platform, leading Taft in possession of it. The Hanna people then left the hall, organized a rump convention and proceeded to name delegates to the State convention and select a committee of fifteen for the conduct of the party during the next year. The regular convention, under the control of the McKinney faction, adjourned.

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
