Weekly Crop Bulletin.

During the week ending Monday, July 13th, 1898, the weather conditions have been very favorable for agricultural interests throughout the State, and the outlook for the present season more promising than in any previous time this season. The drought which has prevailed throughout the State by showers which occurred nearly every day and averaged about 2.75 inches for the State or nearly an inch above the normal. The rains were heavy but washed last night in a two or three southern and western counties; generally heavy showers upon clean, well cultivated fields in condition to receive the greatest benefit, and crops have been wonderfully reinvigorated. The temperature was much lower than last week, but not below the normal except slightly on the 11th, 12th and 13th. Although clouds have been generally heavy there were occasional periods of sunshine. The reports of nearly all correspondents this week are favorable and emphasize the fact that a marvellous condition of affairs was brought about in some extent and some fields have become better.
