Will Sear County Cuba.

Washington, Nov. 13.—The vanquished majority of occupation will sail for Cuba within a fortnight, according to a dispatch from the south coast. Major Gen. Fitzhugh Lee will command the next expedition. These points were determined at the special cabinet session held yesterday.

As for the Spanish troops, leave Cuba. American soldiers will take their places. More than 20,000 Spanish soldiers have already left the island, and Gen. Blanes is proceeding with the evacuation as rapidly as was expected.

All the towns and provinces in Cuba will remain under military control until all the people are organized capable of self-government. The first step will be to determine who is entitled to suffrage.

Wichita, Kan., Nov. 13.—A report received here tonight says that during a terrible storm of meteors or fireballs, Okla. about last night, two children were killed, houses were damaged and the prairie set on fire for miles around.

It is said that six large meteors fell within a radius of a mile. As they struck the earth the concussion was so great that many windows were broken and the people rushed from their homes, fearing an earthquake.

The two children killed were of a family named Henderson. They were asleep together when the great meteor mass crashed through the roof and crushed and burned them to death.

The whole roof fell in, and the family was buried in the ruins. A brother of the children who were killed had his legs and arms broken by falling timbers. The father and mother were pinned in the debris for an hour.

Neighbors came to their assistance and finally rescued them. The meteors were all composed of a substance resembling iron. Some crumbled easily, while others were as hard as steel.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 11, 1898. It is known that Mr. McKinley felt very lively the results administered to Alton by the voters of the county at the Congressional election, and probably that he had not all day long ago, he would not be willing to stand sponsor for Alton.
