

The next Democratic State convention will be held at Greensboro on the 10th day of next July.

This was decided at a meeting of the Democratic State executive committee held at Raleigh on last Tuesday. There was quite a contest between Raleigh and Greensboro, as to which place should be selected for the convention, and in the committee meeting the vote was 37 for Greensboro and 32 for Raleigh.

The committee took no action on the Senatorial question, but left it to be determined by the State convention whether that body will nominate the Senatorial candidate or order a primary.

The date for the convention is later than heretofore, so as to avoid a long and exhausting campaign, which this year it is hoped will be short, sharp and decisive. Most of the counties will hold two county conventions—one to select delegates to the State Congressional and judicial conventions and another later to nominate county candidates. The first conventions will be held in August in the counties during the spring terms of their respective courts.

The candidates to be nominated by the State convention are Chief Justice and two Associate Justices of the Supreme Court a Corporation Commissioner and Superintendent of Public Instruction. The convention will also formally ratify the nominations for superior court judges made by their respective district district conventions. Of course, if these judicial conventions must be held before the State convention is held, it several of the judicial districts there will be quite a contest over the nomination of judges.

There is now no reason why former Democrats who joined the People's party should not return to their "old love." There is certainly no reason or excuse for them any longer co-operating with the Republican party.

The reasons heretofore given by the Populists for co-operating with Republicans were two.

The other reason for co-operating with Republicans was to secure the election law. This objective has been accomplished. The election law that was passed in the last Legislature is undoubtedly the best that any of our Legislatures has passed in five years. No more co-operatingly denigrate it. It is a far better than the election law that the Republicans and Republicans themselves passed. Not only is this true, but it contains all the amendments to the law since that was passed for by the Republicans and Populists.

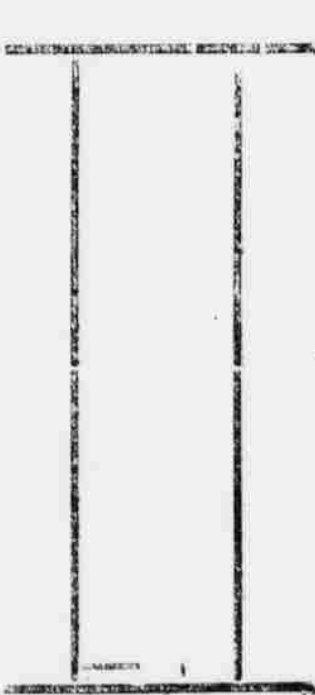
