 Albemarle, Nov. 2.—A distressing accident occurred at the residence of Mr. James Dixon, five miles from here, yesterday afternoon about 3 o'clock. His 12-year-old son Lewis, was returning from play with a comrade, son of Mr. Sam Kirk, a neighbor. He invited the Kirk boy to come home with him and take a look at his new shot gun which his father had bought for him a few days previous. He picked up the "bullet" and gun and pointing it at his companion, pulled the trigger, with the result the gun was discharged, the bullet had entered the head of the unfortunate boy, killing him instantly. The dead boy was about twelve years old. The youth who shot him is charged with grief over the deplorable affair.
