

Vote for State Superintendent.

An official, heretofore, supplied from the Raleigh Morning Post the official vote of all the counties given at the late election for the Democratic and Republican candidates for Superintendent of Public Instruction. Seven thousand people left New Orleans today for the following cities: Port Barrios, Guatemala. The people who have arrived here this week from western Guatemala report a terrible state of affairs as the result of the eruption of Santa Maria volcano. The country for a radius of over thirty miles has been made a desolate waste and every vestige of life destroyed. The total life is estimated at over 7,000, the great majority of the victims being Indians. Ten Indian villages, each with a population of from 50 to 2,000 inhabitants, were wiped out, the ruins being buried beneath tons of volcanic debris. All of the coffee plantations in the volcanic zone are ruined and their owners left penniless. The greatest distress prevails throughout the central and western portions of the republic and even in the eastern part the effects are felt in the scarcity of sugar and the rise in volcanic activity.

Killed by a Falling Tree.

Asheville, Nov. 26.—Horne C. Angle, a white man about 35 years of age, was killed this morning at his home several miles west of town. He was working in the woods in a second-hand saw mill and had been engaged in a storm which had fallen upon the mountain. He was in this position in the air. He had intended to chop down the smaller trees when he was felled by the big tree. He died a short time after work.

Coal Mine in Flames.

Trinidad, Col., Nov. 26.—The Englewood coal mine, six miles south of Trinidad, owned by the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company, is on fire and the fire is beyond control. Two men have lost their lives. The fire started yesterday near an abandoned air shaft, 600 feet from the mouth of the slope. It was not considered serious and 50 men were sent into the mine today. Smoke and gas soon reached the men and they fled for the open air. Many were overcome, but all except the two dead were rescued by their comrades.

Fatal Railroad Wreck.

No. 36, the south-bound night passenger train on the Southern Railway, was wrecked as it entered the Sparta yard about 2 this morning. The colored fireman was killed and Engineer A. B. Solomon, of Charlotte, was seriously injured and baggage-master Joe Mitchell, also of Charlotte, was hurt, but none badly could be feared. Three white passengers and a colored woman were injured, the latter probably fatally, but their names could not be learned.

The wreck occurred on a curve about two blocks north of the Sparta yard. The train was moving at a speed of 25 miles an hour at the time. The engine and the first two cars were derailed. The rest of the train was wrecked. The cause of the wreck is being investigated.
