Reassessment of Railroads.

The corporation commission makes public a statement of the re-assessment of railroads other quasi-public corporations. It shows that railroad property has advanced from \$70,077,-361 to \$\$4,412,833. The assessment of the Atlantic Coast Line is made \$30, 000 a mile; the Seaboard Air Line \$20,424; Southern Railway (all lines) (25.572; North Carolina Railway di vision of Southern \$47,373, giving this division a valuation of \$10,573,762 against \$6,680,000 by the last assessment. Ninety-nine other quasi-public corporations are assessed \$7,072,616 against \$6,173,428 by previous assessment.
