By this agreement those two railroad companies are to obey the railroad rate law passed by the last Legislature until its constitutionality is decided by the Supreme Court of the United States. On the 8th of this month those companies will begin selling tickets at two and a quarter cents a mile, and there will be no more prosecutions of them or their agents for having heretofore violated this law.
