And, I may add, a platform is binding as to what it omits as well as to what it contains. According to the Democratic idea, the people think for themselves, and select officials to carry out their wishes. The voters are the soverigns: the officials are the servants, employed for a fixed time and at a stated salary to do what the soverigns want done, and to do it in the way the soverigns want it done. Platforms are entirely in harmony with this Democratic idea. A platform announces the party's position on the questions which are at issue; and an official is not at liberty to use the authority vested in him to urge personal views which have not been submitted to the votors for their approval. If one is nominated upon a platform which is not satisfactory to him, he must, if candid, either decline the nomination, or in accepting it, propose an amended platform in lieu of the one adopted by the convention. factor in this connection was the large number of warnings of impending trouble. At all the police stations word was received that attacks were organizing by lawless persons, who with a complete day of rest were expected to make the night the time of supreme test between the mob and the troops.

Several complaints were received from nearby villages and hamlets of the existence of threatening conditions. The most insistent came from Chatham, twelve miles south. The negroes there became frightened at the attitude of their white neighbors and asked that troops be sent. Their suokesman was told that the best plan would be for them to come to Springfield and seek protection at the arsenal. The authorities are a bit worried by the conditions in the

outside sections. Scores of negroes have left Springfield, either on foot or by trolley cars, the latter class riding as far as their means permitted and then striking across country. These tramping parties, aimless and penniless, are caus-

ing some complaint from the communities through which they pass. The whites assert that the presence of these negro paupers impose unnecessary burdens and also argue that only the shiftless and immoral manifests itself in other issues; for elements of the Springfield negroes are represented.

Baloon Explosion.

London, By Cable .- The Franco-British exhibition grounds were rocked as by an earthquake Friday and hundreds of windows in the beautiful buildings were broken by the teriffic explosion of a huge balloon of Captain Lovelace, the American aeronaut who had been giving aerial performances. Two spectators were killed outright, a dozen persons were frightfully burned in the mass of flames that engulfed the crowd when the big gas-bag burst, and scores were injured by being trampled on in the mad rush to escape. Captain Lovelace himself was frightfully burned and is in a dangerous condition.

Variety Works at Dawson, Ga., Destroyed by Fire.

Dawson, Ga., Special.-The Variety Works, operated by Baldwin and Company, which was one of the largest enterprises in this section, was destroyed by fire, together with many hundreds of thousands of feet of rough and dressed lumber. The plant had been in operation for 65 years and was enged in the manufacture of Confederate guns during the Civil war. The total loss to the owners will probably foot up \$75,000.

He was a rapid composer and wrote book after book of Gospel hymns. During the last five or six years of his life he was interested in preparing Sankey first met Moody at a Y. M. C. A. convention in Indianapolis. Moody was so charmed with the young man's voice that he urged him to accompany him on his evangelistic tours. Sankey explained that he was married and could not give up his position. "You must come," said Moody. "I cannot get along without you."

Tours with Moody.

Sankey consulted with his wife and they cast in their lot with Mr. Moody. They visited Great Britain from 1873 to 1875, and again in 1883, and made many tours throughout the United States. When Mr. Moody died, Mr. Sankey felt keenly the loss of his friend. From that time he tried to conduct the work alone which they had hitherto shared between them, but the task was too great. In 1902 his physical condition compelled him to give up most of his evangelical engagements, although he continued for some time to compile new series of hymn books. Then came failing eyesight, which speedily developed into total blindness. With the blindness came also a nervous breakdown. After his retirement from public life the impression became general throughout the country that he was dead.

Mr. Sankey lived in Brooklyn for twenty-seven years, and it was there that most of his songs were written. He was a singer from boyhood, and his voice attracted attention in the hamlet of Edenburgh, Pa., where he was born August 28th, 1840. At the beginning of his active life Mr. Sankey was a Methodist, but for the last seven years he had been a Presbyterian. He is survived by a widow, Fanny V. Sankey, his two sons, I. Allen Sankey and Edward Sankey, and two grandchildren.
