FIRE SWEEPS RAWHIDE.

Three Thousand People Rendered Homeless.

Rawhide, Nevv., Special.-As a result of a disastrious fire which ravaged this city on Friday three thousand people are homeless and property is destroved to the amount of \$1,000,-000. The fire started in the Rawhide Drug Company's building and fanned by a gale the flames swept eastward over the town until they reached the People's Hospital.

As a last resort tons of mining dynamite were wheeled into the town square in truks, placed under the block of buildings and touched off by short fuses. The hospital was saved. Miners from surrounding mines aided the fire fighters.

So far as known no one was seriously injured. President King, of the Rawhide Coal and Iron Company, ordered a special train to bring lumber sufficient to erect five large temporary buildings at Rawhide. The ruins were searched to recover valaables lost in the flames. Reconstruction work will occupy five hundred carpenters, commencing next week. Laborers are being imported.
