ANTHRACNOSE DOES GREAT DAMAGE.

Disease in Cotton is Spreading and is Costing Planters Millions.

Columbia, S. C .- In a report just made to Commissioner Watson, State Botanist Barre declares that the disease of anthracnose in cotton is costing the growers of the state probably \$5,000,000 yearly and the Georgia planters possibly as much as \$14,000,-000 each year. According to Mr. Darre, the disease is spreading. Its worst manifestations have followed the use of imported seed, for which reason he urges that inspection of cotton seed be provided for in the proposed legislation to minimize pellagra by the inspection of grain.
