Christian Conference. The annual session of the Western North Carolina Christian Conference was held last week at Hanks' chapel, three miles east of this place, beginning on Tuesday and adjourning on Friday.

We regret to hear of a very unfortunate accident which befell Mr. Bud Poe at a cotton gin at Gulf a few days ago. While catching some seed in the gin his right arm was caught by the saw and so badly torn that it had to be amputated a few inches below his shoulder.

Superior Court. The judge arrived here last Thursday morning about 10 o'clock, having driven through the county from Moncure instead of waiting there for the noon train, in order to save all time possible, as he had been unavoidably detained at Union court trying a murder case.

The judge's charge to the grand jurors was a clear and concise explanation of their duties and the responsibilities devolving upon them and was heard with close attention by them and the bystanders.

Solicitor Stack was promptly at his post of duty and began the prosecution of the cases on the criminal docket, and the following were disposed of: State against K. R. Baum; indicted for false pretense; defendant pleads nolo contendere and judgment suspended on payment of costs.

State against J. C. Lightningburg; larceny; defendant pleads guilty and sentenced to the roads of Anson county for six months. State against James Crutchfield; assault with deadly weapon; defendant pleads guilty and fined \$10 and costs.

State against Dock Cotten; assault with deadly weapon; defendant pleads guilty of simple assault and judgment suspended on payment of costs. State against Dave Horton; assault with deadly weapon; defendant pleads guilty and sentenced to pay the prosecutor \$20 and a fine of \$15 and costs.

State against Jean Farrell; assault with deadly weapon; defendant pleads guilty and judgment suspended on payment of costs. State against George Pittman; carrying concealed weapons; defendant pleads guilty and sentenced to jail for six months with leave for county commissioners to hire out to pay costs.

State against Laura Leach; disturbing public worship; verdict of not guilty. State against Henry De Graffenreid; trespass; defendant pleads guilty and fined \$15 and costs.

The most important criminal case was that of the State against Dixie Alston, colored, who was indicted for burning the stable and barn of Mr. R. R. Smith, in Hadley township, on the night of the 25th of last May. This trial attracted much attention, and, at the close of the evidence, the judge said he did not think the evidence was sufficient to convict the defendant and he was discharged and a nol prosequere entered.

Another case that attracted much attention was the hearing of the application by John Cheek for the custody of his five-year-old daughter, and his wife having separated some time ago and she having retained the child. After hearing much evidence the judge refused to take the child from the mother but ordered that the father might visit it whenever he wished.

No civil cases were tried but several were disposed of by compromise and other wise. Blockade Whiskey. From all that we have heard since our court last week there must have been a considerable quantity of blockade whiskey brought here and drunk by people attending court.

If what we heard be true there must have been a plentiful supply brought here, which indicated that "moonshining" was much indulged in throughout this county. This, however, is not surprising when it is recalled that men are permitted to make whiskey in this county without fear of our county officers interfering with them!
