The Rev. William Booth, general and commander-in-chief of the Salvation Army, is dead in London. He was born at Nottingham in 1829. The veteran Salvation Army leader was unconscious for forty-eight hours previous to his death. The medical bulletins had not revealed the seriousness of the general's condition which, it is now admitted, was hopeless. So great was General Booth's faculty for handling and inspiring men, that Marshal Wolsely once declared that the British army had taken lessons in the methods of organization, distribution and control from the Salvationists. He started his career as a soap box preacher at the age of 15 years. Mexican Federals, numbering 2,300, under command of Gen.
