

der states, "the corps will be stationed at Constantinople."

It is stated that an army of 250,000 Serbian women, equal in number to the entire Serbian regular army, will soon be on the firing line against the Germans. They state that they "are not going to sit at home and see their fathers, husband and brothers driven out of Serbia." Many Serbian women have already been killed.

Sir Edward Carson, attorney general of the British cabinet, has resigned. It is stated that he disapproves the Near East policy, but he himself has yet made no explanation of his conduct.

The maximum price of butter in Germany has been fixed by law at 70 cents a pound. The price had reached 80 cents a pound and was still rising, and the government promptly issued a manifesto fixing the price and forbidding the use of milk for baking, manufacturing chocolate and candy and other similar purposes and forbidding the sale of cream.

## Domestic

A dispatch from Brownsville, Texas, reports that the sixth cavalry fired on and killed two supposed Mexican bandits who were crossing the Rio Grande at the San Pedro ranch, 12 miles up the river from Brownsville.

Representatives of eleven Southern lumber exporting firms met in Memphis, Tenn., and organized a lumber exporters' line. The firms represented at the meeting a capital of \$5,000,000. The ships will carry hardwoods from gulf ports to the principal ports of Europe.


