Cyrus B. -Watson last Saturday at his home in Winston-Salem removes one of North Carolina's most distinguished and patriotic sons, who had rendered this state much service both in war and peace. He was one of the bravest soldiers in the Confederate army and was one who carried a musket throughout the war. Returning from the war a youth without any means he became one of the mest successful and prominent lawyers in this state, and in 1396 he was the Democratic nominee for Governor. In 1903 he was a candidate with Overman, Craig and Carr for the nomination for the United States Senate, and for three weeks the Democratic members of the legislature balloted night after night before making the nomination of Senator Overman by a small majority over Watson.
