Push the Victory Loan

While substantial progress has been made in the Victory loan drive, a more concerted and general effort must be made from now on if the four and a half billion dollar loan is to be completed by May 10th. Our government has but two means of raising money for the payment of its obligations. One is by taxation, on which we get no return. The other is through the sale of securities, which are the safest in the world and on which we not only get back at maturity what we paid in, but we get a liberal rate of interest on our investment as well. As Secretary Glass so fittingly says, this is not only a victory loan, but it is a thanksgiving loan; thanks to God for bringing so many of our boys back, rather than burying them in the soil of a foreign country.

As American citizens we will always receive protection and in return we should show our appreciation by rendering to the government the same help that it renders to us. Just as our government is always ready to protect us regardless of the number of calls, so we should be ready and eager to respond to its present appeal—the Victory Liberty Loan.

Reducing Freight Rates

WALKER D. Hines, Director General of Railroads, announces that all railroads under Federal control will reduce rates on carload shipments of stone (broken, crushed and ground) slag, shells, cherts, chert, sand and gravel shipped during the period from May 1 to December 31, of this year, when for use in road building or road maintenance.

The reduced rates will be 10 cents per ton less than the regularly published tariff rates in effect for the transportation of these materials for commercial uses at the time shipments move; but with a minimum charge of 40 cents per net ton except that where the regularly published commercial rate is less than 40 cents per net ton then such regularly published rate shall apply.

It is said that England and France are standing squarely behind President Wilson in not acceding to Italy's claims to Fiume and other phases of the Italian problem. In high quarters the question is being considered of issuing some form of a joint statement bringing out the fact that Premier Lloyd George and Premier Clemenceau are in complete agreement with President Wilson on these questions.

Two million men were sent to France and their mission was successful. More than one million men are still in France and must be brought home. The government needs your assistance. Buy Victory liberty bonds and war savings stamps.

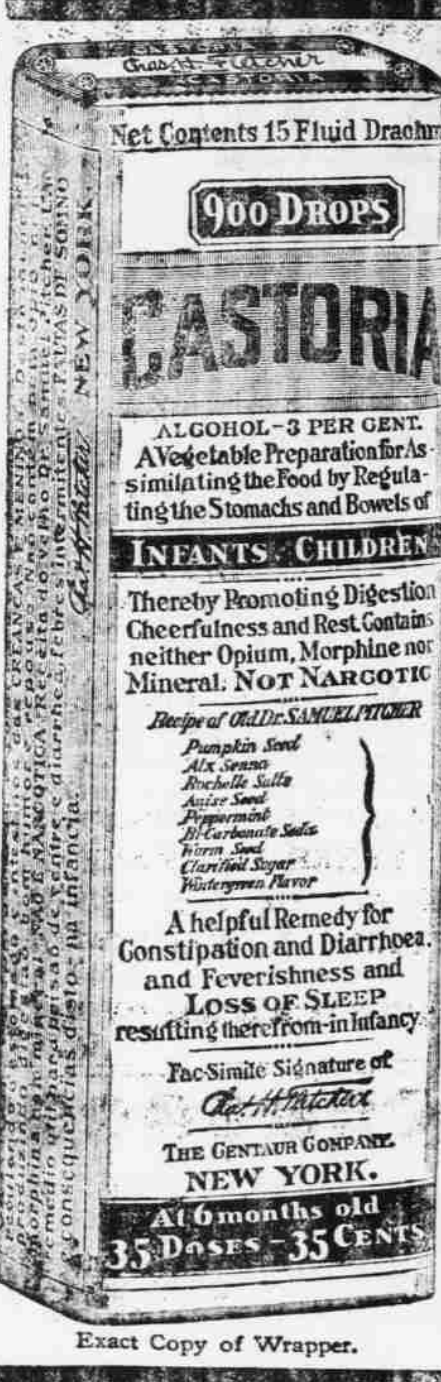
Be Prepared.
 On Saturday, May 3rd, the Boy Scouts will start their campaign to sell Victory loan bonds. Each scout who sells bonds to ten different purchasers will receive a war service medal from the Treasury Department. Arthur London, Jr., and William Hunt received medals for selling bonds during the fourth liberty loan campaign. It is earnestly desired that each scout in the troop will be able to obtain one of these medals during the present Victory bond campaign.

The record that the Boy Scouts have made in selling bonds in the previous campaigns throughout the country is quite enviable. The Boy Scouts made 1,342,794 sales of the first three liberty loans, these sales amounting to \$296,823,900. Incomplete returns of the work of the scouts in the interest of the fourth liberty loan show 507,699 sales amounting to \$88,916,300.

At the regular meeting of the troop on Wednesday, May 7th, there will be work on the subject of semaphore signaling. Each scout is hereby directed to study the semaphore alphabet and to try to learn this alphabet before the time of this meeting.

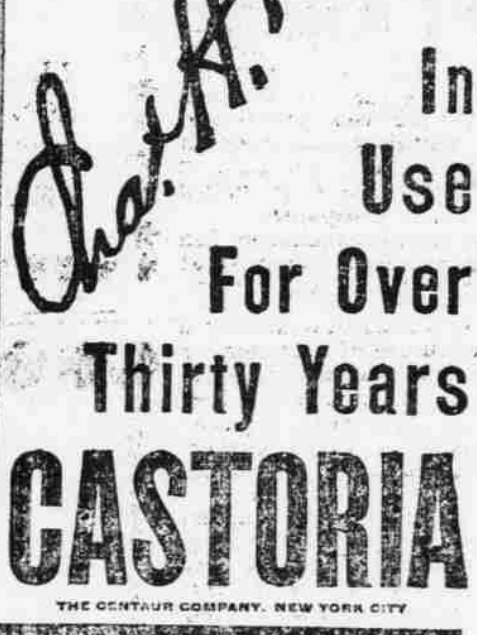

Bond Election

Whereas, a petition, signed by the board of education of the county of Chatham, state of North Carolina, at a session held in Pittsboro, N. C., on the 15th day of March, 1919, requesting an election to be held in Moncure school district, Haw River township, No. 1, for the purpose of submitting the proposition whether the said Moncure school district, Haw River township, No. 1, shall issue bonds for the purpose of purchasing a school house site, building a school house, buying school furnishings, etc., in the sum of \$12,000 at a rate of interest not to exceed six per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and to run for a period not to exceed twenty years, and a special tax to be levied not to exceed 30 cents on the \$100 worth of property and 90 cents on the polls, the said election to be held under and pursuant to and the bonds to be issued in accordance with the provisions of chapter 55 of the Public Laws of North Carolina passed by the General Assembly in 1915 and the amendment thereto.

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the Board of County Commissioners of Chatham county, N. C., that the petition of the board of education be allowed and that an election be held at the regular voting precinct in said Moncure school district, Haw River township, No. 1, in Moncure, N. C., and county of Chatham, on the 20th day of May, 1919, for the purpose of voting \$12,000 of school bonds to provide funds for the purpose of purchasing a school house site, building a school house, buying furnishings, etc., in said Moncure school district, Haw River township, No. 1, in the county of Chatham, North Carolina, said bonds to bear interest at the rate of six per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and to run for a period not to exceed twenty years; and a special tax to be levied not to exceed 30 cents on the \$100 worth of property and 90 cents on the polls. At the said election those who are in favor of said proposition shall vote a ballot on which shall be written or printed the words "For School House Bonds," and those opposed to the proposition shall vote a ballot on which shall be written or printed the words "Against School House Bonds."

Be it further resolved, that the following persons are hereby designated and appointed registrar and judges of said election:
 Registrar—T. B. Maddox.
 Judges—Waverly Laster and C. D. Wilkie.

Be it further resolved, That a copy of these resolutions, signed by the chairman and the clerk of the board of county commissioners, shall be posted at the courthouse door in Pittsboro, N. C., and at the polling place in said Moncure school district, Haw River township, No. 1, and published in the Chatham Record, a paper published in Chatham county, for four successive weeks, as a notice of said election, from the 12th day of April up to and including the 20th day of May, 1919, both dates included.

New Registration
 Whereas, the General Assembly of North Carolina, at its session in 1915, enacted a law to permit counties, townships and certain school districts to issue bonds to build school houses, and being chapter 55 of the Public Laws of North Carolina, entitled on the 24th day of February, 1915, as follows:
 "Whereas, the board of county commissioners of Chatham county, under the authority of the power conferred upon them by the act aforesaid, and pursuant to a petition properly signed and presented to it, the said commissioners, by their regular board of education, has called an election for the purpose of submitting to the voters of Moncure school district, Haw River township, No. 1, a proposition to issue \$12,000 worth of school house bonds, said election to be held on the 20th day of May, 1919; and

Whereas, the said act confers upon the board of county commissioners authority and power to order a new registration of the voters of said Moncure school district, Haw River township, No. 1.
 Now, therefore, be it resolved by the board of county commissioners of Chatham county, that a new registration of the voters of Moncure school district, Haw River township, No. 1, be had and that the registration books for said election be opened on the 15th day of April, 1919, at 9 o'clock a. m. and sunset each day, Sunday excepted, up to and including the 10th day of May, 1919. On each Saturday during the period of the registration, the registration books shall attend with his registration books at the voting place in his precinct in said Moncure school district, Haw River township, No. 1, for the registration of voters, and on said day the books shall remain open between the hours of 9 o'clock a. m. and sunset.

Be it further resolved, That the following person hereby designated and appointed registrar for said new registration and for said election:
 Registrar—T. B. Maddox.

Be it further resolved, That a copy of these resolutions, signed by the chairman and clerk of the board of

county commissioners of Chatham county, N. C., be posted at the courthouse door in Pittsboro, N. C., and at the polling place in said Moncure school district, Haw River township, No. 1, as a notice of said new registration from the 8th day of April, 1919, up to and including the 10th day of May, 1919, both dates included.

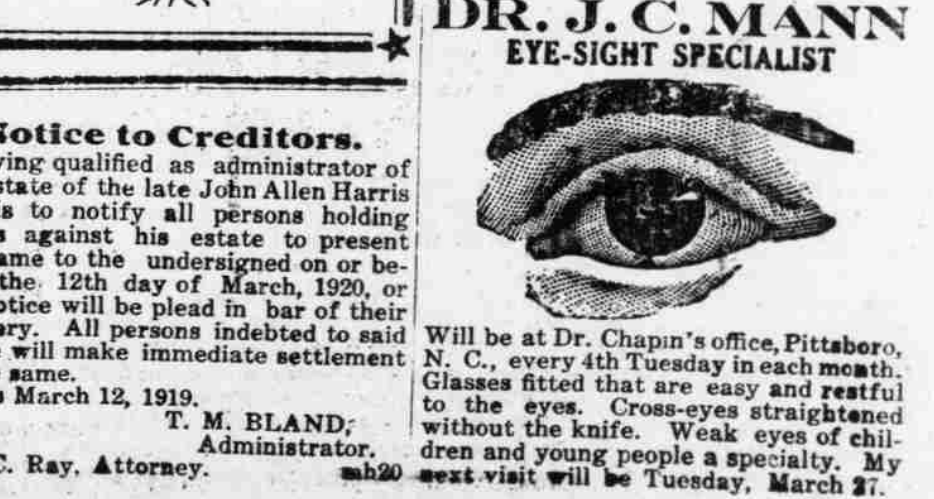
