The League of Nations. MEN who would rip the covenant of the League of Nations wide open, and incidentally wreck the treaty of peace, are exceedingly boastful of their Americanism and their patriotism.

It happens that soldiers of the United States who have seen service in France and Belgium are in most cases unable to comprehend Americanism of this description, which explains the adoption by veterans at Birmingham, Ala., of a resolution advising everybody to keep away from a meeting to be addressed by Senator Reed, of Missouri, in opposition to the treaty.

Clean-Up Week October 6-11. THE State Insurance Department is laying much stress right now on Clean-Up Week, October 6 to 11, which Commissioner Young hopes to make the most effective on record.

October 9th is designated by statute as Fire Prevention Day in North Carolina and for this reason the week in which this date falls has been set apart as clean-up week for the entire State. It is also observed nationally.

Highway Expenditures 1918

BASED on complete reports from 44 States, cash expenditures on the rural routes and bridges of the United States for the calendar year 1918, amounted to \$286,098,193. This is in addition to the value of convict labor, which cannot be estimated with any degree of accuracy but probably amounted to not less than \$14,000,000, making the total expenditures for the year \$300,000,000.

AMID applause from Senators and spectators the Senate on last Thursday in open executive session unanimously confirmed the nomination of John J. Pershing to the permanent rank of general of the regular army as a reward for his services as commander of the American expeditionary force.

It takes less time for an airplane to cross the Atlantic than it does for any of the Senators opposed to the League of Nations to make a complete speech against it, and both airplanes and dirigibles may go back and forth many times while they are finding the necessary reasons for their opposition.

As Affecting Chatham County--When to Hunt

Now that the open season for hunting game of various kinds is approaching, our readers will doubtless be interested in knowing just what the law is as to hunting game in Chatham county. The first date of the open season and the first date of the closed season are given below:

Deer and pheasants, Nov. 1-Nov. 15; quail (partridge) and turkey, Nov. 15-March 1; dove, Nov. 1-March 1; woodcock, Nov. 15-Jan. 1; yellowlegs, golden plover, Sept. 1-Dec. 1; ducks, geese and snipe, Nov. 1-Feb. 1; opossum, Oct. 1-Feb. 1, foxes, Sept. 1-Feb. 1.

FOR THE FARMER

Features of Soil Improvement H. M. Kinsey, County Agent.

At this time the attention of the farmer should be turned to a method of improving his soil for another crop. To do this there are two fundamental principles that invite his careful consideration.

The use of winter cover crops is another practice that should not escape the progressive farmer's attention. With land that has not been improved, rye seems to give best results. On other soils clover is highly recommended for cover crops.

The last Legislature passed a law requiring owners of dogs to pay tax on and tag their dogs. The tax is due October 1st. After December 1st, if the tax is not paid and the dogs tagged, the law makes the owners guilty of a misdemeanor and subjects them to a fine of not more than \$50 or to imprisonment of not more than 30 days.

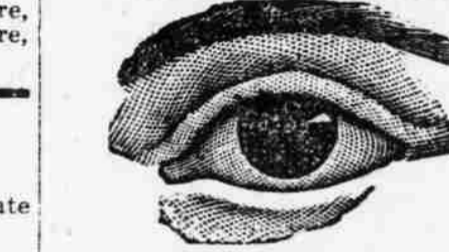

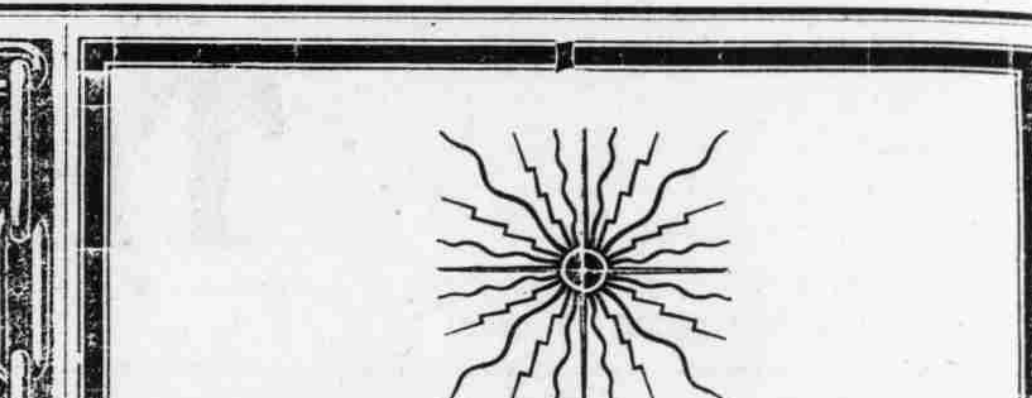
