SOLDIER'S POLL TAX

ATTORNEY General James S. Manning has ruled that soldiers or sailors still in the service of their country until after the time of listing poll tax in 1919 are exempt from payment and may vote in the coming primary without payment of tax.

These soldiers, either by their sense of obligation to their native country, or by the compulsion of the Federal Government, were, in their service to that country, placed in such a position that they could neither list nor pay these taxes.

JUDGE George H. Brown has announced that he will not be a candidate for re-election as an associate justice of the supreme court, which position he has so acceptably filled for the past sixteen years.

The name of Ex-Judge R. W. Winston, of Raleigh, is also prominently mentioned as a candidate. Should he consent to let his name be presented to the primaries, he would doubtless poll a large vote, as all who know him feel that he possesses every qualification for a supreme court judge.

Since the above was put in type, Judge W. J. Adams, of Carthage, has announced his candidacy. His many friends in Chatham will doubtless be pleased to give him their whole-hearted support.
