PROCEEDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE

\$10,000,000 IS ESTIMATED AS PROBABLE REVENUE FROM TAX BILL REPORTED.

AD VALOREM TAX A SURPRISE

"Present Liquor Laws are Inadequate Because of Being So Loosely Constructed by Courts of the State."

Raleigh. Carrying an ad valorem tax of five cents on the hundred dollars for schools and a graduated income tax ranging from one to three per cent the revenue act for 1921 was introduced in the lower branch of the general assembly and placed on its first reading.

It anticipates a little more than ten million dollars for the maintenance of the state government during the coming year and for the support of the educational and charitable institutions. The ad valorem tax is contrary to the hope of the "best minds" in the legislature, but with its announcement is the statement that North Carolina cannot hold a progressive stride without it.

The introduction of this bill in the house by Governor Doughton, and defeat before a committee of the 1921 prohibition bill were the outstanding legislative developments of the day.

There is evident much surprise that the finance committee should have incorporated the ad valorem tax in its revenue bill this time. Opponents are making a great deal of fuss over the democrats pledges of 1920 not to again levy an ad valorem for state purposes. The proposal to put it in the bill was bitterly resisted in the committee by Senator Gallert and Representative Townsend, of Harnett and the committee once back-tracked.

At a late meeting however, they agreed to re-insert the clause carrying the property tax for state purposes, and in this shape the bill came to the house.

It will occasion a hard fight but on top of the announcement that it is included in the revenue program, is the statement that a vigorous fight will be made in the senate to put an ad valorem tax in the road bill.

A warm fight in the judiciary committee developed when Representative Cooke's bill to harmonize the state laws with the Volstead act was up for consideration.

The Cook measure carried an appropriation of \$20,000 and an extra court tax of \$50 for each conviction, the same to be employed as a special fund for organizing a state police system and maintaining a legal force for assisting the attorney general to enforce the law.

During the discussion, Mr. Davis declared that the present laws are chiefly inadequate because of the loose construction of the North Carolina courts. He chastised the venerable Venable Bond, of Edenboro because that judge has held that the possession of a gallon of whiskey is no evidence that its holder is keeping it for sale.

County participation in the pensioning of Confederate veterans is provided for in the only bill of statewide importance found among the 42 new ones, offered by Mr. Matthews, of Bertie.

Authority is conferred upon the commissioners to levy a county tax to supplement the pensions given by the state.

Stock Law Bill Passed.

Matthews of Bertie fought a losing battle with Murphy of Rowan and the house successfully declined to allow the statewide stock law bill to go to a vote of the people in the territory involved, except any county from the provisions of the law, or to kill the law outright. Stock law is a reality in every county in eastern North Carolina.

And with the passage of the act, the house put behind it all thought of cattle ticks and sacred scrub heifers for the term, and no more, by common consent, will be said about eradication. The house had already killed eradication overwhelmingly, and no note will be taken of the senate's enactment, other than to table the measure when it is reported over.

Thus passed a vexation that has plagued every session of the general assembly for the past generation. The last bulwark of the sacred scrub heifers and bony pine woods roofer went down before the implacable driving of the resourceful Murphy, and the sacred beasts of the east must be confined with fences.

Differ With Budget Commission.

Appropriations of \$5,850,000 for permanent improvements on a five-year program instead of the recommendation of the Budget Commission for \$995,000 on a two-year basis, was strongly urged by friends of the University of North Carolina at a hearing before the full committees on appropriations of the house and senate.

The recommendations of the trustees of the University differ from those of the Budget Commission in three important particulars: A five year program instead of one for two years; expenditure during the next two years of \$2,750,000 instead of \$995,000; and the erection of sectional dormitories at the cost of \$1,200 a student instead of temporary structures at a cost of \$416 a student.

Roads Ordered to Change Rates.

Washington, (Special).—Railroads of North Carolina were ordered by the interstate commerce commission to increase their passenger rates to the level of those in effect in interstate commerce, to take effect March 29, 1921.

The roads were also ordered to reduce the baggage allowance of 200 pounds per passenger to 150 pounds, as required by interstate regulations.

Appointments by The Governor.

Governor Morrison announced the appointment of R. O. Everett, of Durham, chairman, and A. W. McLean of Lumberton and L. J. Baker of Palmyra as members of the North Carolina cotton commission created under the Everett resolution passed at this general assembly.

The object of this commission, which is created to work with similar bodies in all the southern states, is to bring to the cotton industry of the south a marketing system fashioned after the co-operative plan of the California fruit growers.

Protest by Wholesale Grocers.

Washington, (Special).—Brownlow Jackson for United States Marshal for western North Carolina and Frank A. Linney of Boone, for district attorney, succeeding Stonwall Jackson Durham of Gastonia, appear to be about as certain as anything can be according to republican politicians who are keeping up with patronage republicans.

According to the best "dope" there is apparently no one opposing either Jackson or Linney for these places.

Two Unfavorable Reports.

The house committee on propositions and grievances ordered an unfavorable report on the traveling men's bill regulating rates to be charged at hotels by a vote of ten to six. The "anti-tipping" bill was also reported unfavorably.

Educators Swamp Committee.

Train loads of educators from Charlotte, Greensboro, Asheville, Wilmington and other big towns in the state swamped down upon a legislative committee and made an impressive plea for twenty millions for higher education.

Captain Bob Williams, of Asheville, and Mrs. Chas. C. Hook, of Charlotte, were easily the strongest proponents of the bigger program. The hall of the house was packed almost as tight as it was during the censorship fight of the afternoon.

Good Road Bill Passes House.

The Doughton-Connor-Bowie good roads bill providing for a statewide system of modern highways passed its final reading in the lower house of the general assembly by a vote of 102 to 11.

The vote was taken after a joint session which convened to hear an address by Thomas Dixon and the result was announced by Representative Exum Clement, of Buncombe county. Speaker Grier surrendered the chair to Miss Clemons soon after the clerk began to call the roll.

DANIELS IS TO GO INTO CHAUTAUQUA

WILL MAKE FIRST APPEARANCE ON LECTURE PLATFORM AT ASHEVILLE, MAY 16.

BUFFALO HERD IS AUGMENTED

Colonel Galbraith brings a Cheerful Message to the Infirm Soldiers at U. S. Public Health Hospital.

Asheville.—That Joseph Daniels, secretary of the navy will engage in chautauqua work following his retirement from the cabinet is indicated in receipt here of the program of the Red Path chautauqua, which will be here for six days beginning May 16. Mr. Daniels is programed as one of the principal lecturers.

The buffalo herd on Mount Pisgah preserve has been augmented by the arrival of Daniel Boone II, and two buffalo heifers. The new arrivals came from the Austin Corbin herd in New Hampshire, shipped by express to Hoinny station, from whence they were hauled in wagons up the mountain road to the park.

"America seems to have forgotten that we had a war, but the American Legion is going to see that you fellows get all that you deserve. I speak for an organization representing 1,000,000 men and 11,000 posts in the United States, Canada and throughout the world," was the cheerful message given to the infirm service men at Kenilworth, United States public health hospital, by Col. F. W. Galbraith, typifying the spirit of the American Legion, of which he is the national commander.

Elon College.—Announcement was made of the speakers for the approaching commencement, May 22-14. The baccalaureate sermon is to be preached by Herman Eldridge, who was camp general secretary of the Y. M. C. A. at Camp Upton, Long Island, during the entire war.

The college authorities also announce that the literary address on May 24, is to be given by Governor Cameron Morrison, the progressive governor of the state.

Dunn.—Approximately \$50,000 a year will be provided Harnett county for road construction and maintenance if a bill now before the legislature is adopted. The bill has been introduced by Representative N. A. Townsend. Action is being held up until Mr. Townsend can be informed as to the will of the people in the matter.

A tax of one-fifth of one per cent, or 20 cents on the \$100 in taxable wealth of the county, is proposed in the bill.

Wilmington.—Incorporation of an ad valorem tax of five cents for state purposes in the revenue act pending before the legislature is in direct contravention of the pledges made by the democratic party during the recent campaign, the executive committee of the Wilmington chamber of commerce declared, in a strongly worded petition.

Wilson.—Wilsonians are proud of their colored people, some of whom are among the thriftiest in the Southern States. The Commercial bank of Wilson, chartered with an authorized capital of \$50,000, is now an assured fact, and the home of the institution will be ready by the last of March.

Mount Airy.—On March 2 all alumnae, alumni and former students of North Carolina Methodist institutions and all Methodist graduates and old students of other institutions, are invited to Mount Airy to participate in a district wide educational gathering.

Washington, (Special).—Friends of Representative Claude Kitchin want him to remain ranking member of the ways and means committee, to stand by the historic democratic policy of a tariff for revenue only. It is believed he will stay on that job.

Would Hold Power Company. Gastonia.—A. C. Jones, attorney representing users of Southern Power company electric power has returned from Raleigh where he had gone in the interest of users of electric power.

The bill prepared by Mr. Jones and already introduced in the general assembly would hold the Southern Power company to its original contract in the event the corporation commission grants the increase asked for by the Southern Power company.

Pageant at Summer Camp.

Asheville.—Mrs. T. W. Bickett, commander of the forthcoming U. S. training camp corps for women to be held in this city next summer has announced plans for a gigantic pageant to be held as one of the features of the 1921 encampment. Miss E. Grimble, who staged a pageant in Raleigh last year, will have charge.
