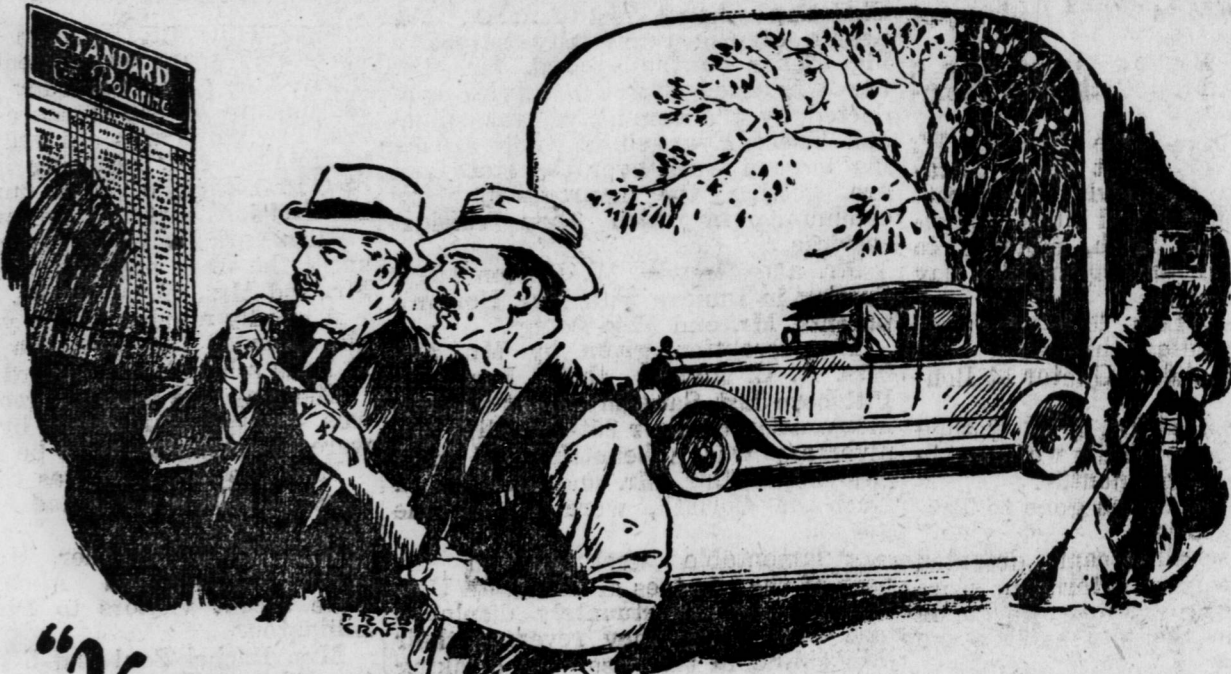
"Black we are but much admired; men seek for us till they are tired. We tire the hares, but comfort man; tell me this riddle if you can."

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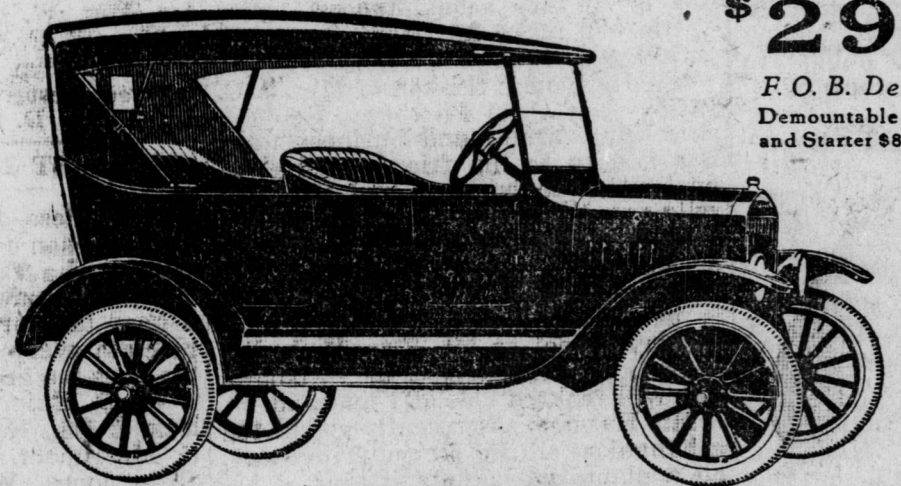


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
