**AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING \$40,000 WATER BONDS.**

Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of The Town of Pittsboro:

Section 1. That the Town of Pittsboro do issue its bonds pursuant to the Municipal Finance Act to an amount not exceeding \$40,000 for the purpose of constructing a municipal water supply system.

**AN ORDINANCE ORDERING SPECIAL ELECTION IN THE TOWN OF PITTSBORO.**

Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of The Town of Pittsboro:

Section 1. That those two certain ordinances adopted by the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Pittsboro on the 12th day of March, 1928, authorizing the issuance of \$40,000 Water Bonds for the purpose of constructing a municipal water system, and the issuance of \$10,000 for the purpose of constructing a municipal sanitary sewer system, and the levy of a tax for the payment thereof, shall be submitted to the voters of said Town for their approval or rejection at a special election to be held on the 8th day of May, 1928.

Section 2. That for said election a new registration of the voters of said Town is hereby ordered, and for such purpose a Registration book for said new registration shall be kept open between the hours of 9 o'clock A. M. and 6 o'clock P. M. on each day (except Sundays and Holidays) from the 9th day of April, 1928, to the 28th day of April, 1928. On each Saturday during the period of said new registration above set forth the Registrar shall attend with this Registration book at the voting place for the registration of voters.

Section 3. That all voters residing in the Town of Pittsboro shall vote at the Chatham county court house, which is hereby designated as the polling place for said town, and C. C. Hamlet is hereby designated and appointed Registrar, and F. C. Williams and J. N. Peoples, Judges for said new registration and election.

Section 4. That a copy of this ordinance signed by the Mayor and Clerk of this Board shall be published as a notice of said new registration at least once not later than March 28th, 1928, and as a notice of election at least once not later than April 18th, 1928, both of the

said publications to be made in the Chatham Record a newspaper published in the Town of Pittsboro.
