Brief, Harmonious **County Convention**

37 Uninstructed Delegates and Aiternates Chosen To Cast Chatham's 22 Votes in State Convention.

The county convention was small, short, and harmonious. The convention was promptly called to order at 11 o'clock Saturday morning by Chairman W. P. Horton, Dewey Dorsett was called to the chair and Dr. Elkins of Siler City to act as secretary. On motion the temporary organization was made permanent. The chairman called upon Hon.

Walter D. Siler to speak, and that gentleman made a brief but telling address in which he indicated that the success of the Democratic ticket in county, state, and nation, was to be taken for granted. Even high-up Republicans have said it is a Democratic year. The stink of the corruption in the recent administration rises to heaven, has filled the nostrils of the people, and they will "turn the rascals out." "Honesty" is a sufficient platform for the Democrats in the nation. The party is not basing its campaign upon some equivocal proposition but upon the fundamental principle of honesty in administration. It makes it easy for all elements to harmonize on such a platform. A united party will do the business.


