This isolated announcement would give color to the suspicion, that Gen. Taylor is so exclusively wedded to his own proposed plan for settling the difficulties of the country, as to bestow countenance on none other; but such, we are confident, is not, and cannot be, the case. We feel well assured, that the President, with that unselfish patriotism which has distinguished his eminent career, will rejoice to see the vexatious disputes of the day adjusted upon any honorable plan of compromise. If we did not feel so assured, we should have lost much of that confidence which we have deighted to repose in the gallant veteran, whose whole life has been passed in the service of his country. The "Republic." we presume. in the remark that Gen. Taylor prefers a different plan from that reported by the Senatorial Committee, by no means intends to intimate that he would not cheerfully yield to the Compromise, should it be adopted by Congress, or that he does not stand ready to sanction every effort to give

peace and harmony to the country. Such, however, we must say, is but an inference that the unguarded language of the "Republic" would If a supposed discountenance or opposition on

the part of Gen. Taylor be the only obstacle in the way of the Compromise, we may well felicitate storation of tranquility. But that prospect is yet obscured by doubts, and hidden from view by the fitful gusts of passion and prejudice. 
