The government, he thinks, may grant alternate sections of the public lands to railroad companies, and sell the reserved sections for double the mini mum price; it is the policy of the government to encourage the settlement of the public lands; and lands—the government may give away portions of the public domain for the purpose of enhancing the balance. According to this mode of reasoning it may speculate on the moneybny lottery tickets, shave notes, and set up a doggery for the sale of gin cock-tails: in short, embark in any business by which a penny can be turned. 
