GOV. VANCE'S MESSAGE.

We devote a good deal of our space today to Gov. Vance's Message. It is rather long, but considering the present position of affairs, and the many important subjects to be acted upon and disposed of, could not, perhaps, well have been shorter. His recommendations will meet with the assent of the people, always saving and excepting the speculators and extortioners, who will not relish the idea of forking up in the way of taxation some of their ill-gotten gains. It will be very hard, however, to catch a great many of these fellows. Men whose consciences permit them to act as they have done will not stickle much about the sanction of an oath.

RICHMOND.

We have very little doubt that the Yankees will make a desperate attempt to take Richmond this winter. Not only does the removal of McClellan for not moving fast enough indicate this purpose, but it is shadowed forth by the temper in which the Black Republicans have received the result of the recent elections. This purpose is, if they can, to finish the war by subjugating the South, and carrying out all their diabolical schemes-emancipation, confiscation, &c .before the next Congress meets and the Conservatives come into power. Neither the weather, the condition of the roads, nor any other obstacle, will be a plea for Burnside if he fails to advance. He must "on" towards Richmond, or incur the fate of McClellan.

THE NEW SECRETARY OF WAR. We learn from the Richmond papers that the appointment of Secretary of War has been tendered by the President to the Hon. James A. Seddon. Mr. Seddon is a gentleman of fine talents, but unless his health has in late years undergone a great change for the better, we should think the duties of the War office at this time would be a great deal deal too laborious for him.

DEATH OF WM. BALLARD PRESTON. The Hon. William Ballard Preston died at his residence in Montgomery county, Virginia, on Sunday last.

Mr. Preston was a long time in public life. He served for years in both branches of the Legislature of Virginia, represented his District one term in the Congress of the United States, was Secretary of the Navy under General Taylor, was a member of the late Virginia State Convention, and at the time of his death was a Senator of the Confederate Congress.

THE ENEMY AT FRANKLIN .- The enemy, supposed to number considerably over a brigade, appeared on Wednesday last at Franklin, on the Blackwater river, and attempted to cross under cover of shells. The Confederates registed successfully for two hours, when to be printed. the Abolitionists retired. Our forces esptured twelve or fourteen. Our loss none, so far as heard from.

The citizens of Richmond have raised by subscription \$40,000 for the purchase of shoes, blankets, &c., for the soldiers.

NORTH CAROLINA LEGISLATURE. SENATE.-In the Senate on Tuescay a House

resolution was adopted to purchase one copy of the Ordinances of the Convention for each mem! ber of the General Assembly. The Governor's message was received and read, and then the Senate proceeded to the election of Public Printer, with the following result: For. W. W. Holden, 27; for Willie J. Palmer, 9; for Jno. Spelman, 1: for J. L. Pennington, 1. The Committee to superintend the election reported the joint vote of the two Houses as follows: Whole number of votes cast 134, of which Mr. Holden received 79, Mr. Palmer 53, and Mesers. Pennington and Spelman l each. Mr. Holden was declared duly elected,

and then the Senate adjourned.

House of Commons.—In the House on Tuesday Mr. Fowle introduced a resolution to appoint a committee of five, to consider the expediency of appointing a State agent to purchase provisions in the eastern portion of the State, transporting them to the interior, and there disposing of them for

the relief of the people.

Mr. Foy introduced a resolution, stating that whereas great complaints existed among the peo-ple, relative to the high price of provisions, salt, leather, &c., growing out of the scarcity of these articles and owing to extortioners and speculators, that the committee on the judiciary be requested to examine into the subject, and, if possible, to pregare a bill to meet the exigencies of the case. A resolution was adopted to purchase one copy of the Ordinances of the Convention for each member of the General Assembly and one for each of the Clerks.

Mr. Foy presented a memorial from, and the proceedings of, a meeting of the citizens of Onslow elative to the unprotected state of their county. Read and laid on the table.

The Governor's message was received, read, and 20 copies for each member and 100 copies for the Executive office ordered to be printed. Mr. Peebles introduced a bill, to exempt per-

sons, over 45 years of age, from militia duty.-Read and laid on the table.

At one o'clock the House proceeded to the election of Public Printer, Messrs. Holden and W. J. Palmer, Principal of the Institution for the Deaf and Dumb and the Blind, were put in nomination. Judge Shepherd and others advocated the election of Mr. Palmer open the ground that by having the work done at the Institution a considerable saving to the State might be effected. The vote was taken, and Mr. Palmer received a large majority; but before the vote was announced, it was stated by Messrs. Fowle and Mann, of Pasquotank, that the office of the Institution could not do the work, and thereupon a number of members changed their votes to Mr. Holden, which effected

WHEREAS, The Confederate Congress in an Act known as the "Military Exemption Bill," by the exemption of such persons as may be the owners of twenty or more negroes, and also such as own 500 head of cattle, 500 head of sheep, or 250 head of horses or mules, have in the opinion of this General Assembly made unjust discrimination between such persons and their less fortunate fellow-citizens, contrary to the spirit of our institutions and in direct violation of the 3d section of our Bill of Rights, declaring, "That no man or set of men are entitled to exclusive emoluments or returned citizen has taken the fever since privileges from the community, but in consideration of public services." Therefore, be it Resolved. By the General Assembly, that we do

not believe there exists a necessity for such distinctions, and we most respectfully ask our Senstors and Representatives in Congress to bring this matter to the consideration of Congress, and urge a repeal of said clauses at the earliest possible

FROM FREDERICKSBURG.

Our advices from Fredericksburg are to noon of yesterday. The intelligence from that quarter is of a highly important and interesting character, but most of it not proper for present publication. There has been no cannonading on either side since Monday night, but the enemy has been busy putting cannon in position on Stafford Hills, opposite the town and for a mile above. Nothing is yet positively known of the enemy's strength, but from cobservations made on Tuesday night, and information from other sources. deemed authentic, near the whole Abolition army is believed to be concentrated at that point. On Tuesday night the Abolition camp fires from high points on this side of the river, could be seen stretching over a vast area of country; and eleven Abolitionists captured yesterday in a raid made into Stafford by five of our cavalry, report their force at one hundred rna ten thousand

Of our preparations to receive this host, we will not speak, except to say that we believe them to be ample, and know that before the enemy

crosses the Rappahanack he must fight. As Burnside, by the very terms of his acceptance of McClellan's position is committed to the onward to Richmond policy, it is not likely that he will long sit idly before Fredericksburg. LATEST FROM FREDERICKSBURG. RICHMOND, Nov. 20 .- When the railroad train from Richmond was within one mile of Fredericksburg, this morning, the enemy opened fire upon it from the opposite side of the river, without effect. They fired several shots with long range guns, but were not replied to.

The general situation remains unchanged, the enemy not yet having attempted to cross the river. No news from our army.

TRADE REVOLUTION AT THE NORTH. The journeymen shoemakers of New York have formed a protective association, for the purpose of securing higher wages, as they are unable to support themselves and families, in consequence of the high price of provisions, &c., on the remuneration they now receive. The weighmasters' men and masons are about to take similar steps. The men in the gas houses have also demanded higher wages, which will probably be given them.

The hostlers in the employment of the Second Avenue Railroad Company in New York, struck for higher wages on Tuesday, and arming them-selves with clubs, assaulted a number of laborers, who refused to join in the movement. The police promptly arrested five of the ringleaders. The accused were locked up for the night, which had the effect of putting a stop to any further trouble. The journeymen coopers of Boston have held a meeting, and resolved to raise their wages from
