THE PRESIDENCY—GENERAL JACKSON.

One advantage to be derived to our country from the elevation of General Jackson to the Presidency is, that it will be eminently calculated to preserve to us the inestimable blessings of peace. Foreign nations would not dare to violate the rights of a great people who had a Jackson at their head. This name is equivalent to an army and would extort justice from the fears of those who want a better motive to guide them. His stern, inflexible justice, is well seconded by his determined resolution. He would demand justice and have it; others would complain and write and talk and negotiate and inflame petty grievances into incurable hatreds and war. It is energy that maintains peace as well as gives a favorable issue to war. Should Jackson become our President no hostile foot would ever dare to invade the sanctity of our Capitol.

This number is closed. The exalted merits of General Jackson do not require the labored flourishes of rhetorical language to recommend them to favor. A name that is equivalent to an army may well stand in the place of an essay.

North-Carolina Female ACADEMY.

THIS Institution which during the present year has been located in Williamborough, will open in OXFORD, on the first Monday in February next. The principals have been induced to a change of residence, with a view to a permanent establishment where the premises will comfortably accommodate their pupils; and they have altered the time of commencing the scholastic year, for the convenience, and at the general request of their patrons.

The pupils are instructed in Needle-work, Reading, Writing, Arithmetic, Grammar and Parsing, Geography, Mythology, History, Belles Lettres, Natural Philosophy, Chemistry, Botany and Astronomy.

The terms for board, washing and tuition, in all the above branches, are Sixty Dollars per session payable in advance. Music, vocal and instrumental, Thirty Dollars per session. Drawing and Painting, Twenty Dollars per session. Dancing is also taught by a competent master.

The first session will end early in July, the second in December, when the only vacation in the year takes place. New scholars pay from the time of their arrival only.

The system of education, is in all the departmental radical, by the aid of an excellent apparatus, the truths of Natural Philosophy, Chemistry and Astronomy, are experimentally illustrated, and are thus rendered objects of sense. There are six teachers constantly engaged; three excellent Piano Fortes, are employed in the musical department, and the models for Drawing and Painting, are numerous and good.

No expenditures are allowed, but such as are authorized by parents or guardians; and the principals are determined strictly to enforce the rule prohibiting finery in dress; in summer, coloured cotton dresses, and in winter, worsted stuffs, will be worn by all the young ladies.

All the pupils will board with the principals, who pay strict attention to their health, their manners, and their morals. The public and private offices of devotion are regularly observed, whilst every thing sectarian is carefully avoided.

Each pupil is expected to bring a covered pair of sheets, blankets and towels, for her own use, otherwise an extra charge of \$2.50 per session will be made.

When payment in advance cannot be made, approved bonds will in all instances be exacted.
