The number of pupils, shall be limited to twenty; but the school will go into ope-

tion with ten, or with any less number. 2. That the attention of the instructor may not be too much divided, and that full time may be given for each recitation, the pupils shall not, at any time, be divided into more

3. The object of the school shall be, to preare the pupils for entering, with credit, the University of this State, or any other University or College in the United States.
