Justice to ourselves requires we should add something on the subect .- We had more than once heard of the letter of Gen. Jackson in question, and a short time since we perused a letter from a very intelligent and respectable gentleman in Pittsborg, mentioning the first that Gen. Jackson had recommended the appointment of two federalists, by Mr. Monroe, as part of his cab Inet. A correspondent in Harrisburg likewise communicated the same information. A few days ago, we neard of this letter in a more tangible shape. We were informed that such a let ter had been read by Mr. Monroe to the two gentlemen who represent this State in the Senate of the Union.

The facts, as stated to us are briefly these Messrs. Lowrie and Findlay waited on the President, during the session of 1821-2, to remonstrate against the appointment of Mr. Irish, as Marshal of the Western District of Pennsylvania; that the President, on that occasion, took an opportunity to speak of the principles which had governed his administration, and to show what had been recommended to him by some of the most distinguished individuals in the country, and then read the letter of Gen. Jackson to these gentlemen, inwhich he recommends the appoint men of wo Federalists and Two Republicans to constitute the cabinet of his administration.

We have no communication with either of the Senators from Pennsylvania on this suoject, nor do we make this statement on the personal assurance of either of them. We do, however, believe, that such a letter was exhibited to them and to others, and until we are assured our informants are much in error, we shall continue to believe there is some strange misconception on this subject.

There is one simple mode of testing its accuracy; Mr Monroe may have received and as above stated read such a letter, and yet have forgotten it; it is not however probable. that Gen. Jackson wrote such a letter and coul. have forgotten it. Let Gen.
