Gen. JACKSON declares that he never wrote a letter to the President, advising him to appoint "two distinguished federalists and two distinguished democrats" as members of his cabinet.

From the Democratic Press of Jan. 20, 1824.

In compliance with the request of our old, esteemed, and valued friend, Mr. CREMER, we publish his letter. Justice to ourselves requires we should add something on the subject.

The facts, as stated to us are briefly these: Messrs. Lowrie and Findlay waited on the President, during the session of 1821-2, to remonstrate against the appointment of Mr. Irish, as Marshal of the Western District of Pennsylvania.

We have no communication with either of the Senators from Pennsylvania on this subject, nor do we make this statement on the personal assurance of either of them.

There is one simple mode of testing its accuracy; Mr. Monroe may have received and as above stated read such a letter, and yet have forgotten it; it is not however probable, that Gen. Jackson wrote such a letter and could have forgotten it.

Sir: Having read in your paper of Wednesday last, a charge against Gen. Jackson, as follows: "We have been led to these remarks from having recently heard, in such a manner as to leave no doubt in our mind as to the truth of the statement, that when Mr. Monroe was about to form his cabinet in 1816-17, Gen. Jackson wrote a letter to Mr. Monroe, recommending him to appoint two distinguished Federalists and two distinguished Democrats, as his Secretaries to form his cabinet."

The above charge being evidently calculated to make an impression that Gen. Jackson is the Federal candidate, and thereby to injure him with the democratic party, and believing that the General's character has been assailed by men who envy talents they cannot equal, and virtues they cannot emulate, I conceived it my duty at once to ascertain the truth or falsehood of the above charge.

WASHINGTON, March 5th, 1824.

Sir—After the nomination of Mr. Irish, as Marshal of the Western District of Pennsylvania, in the winter of 1821, my colleague, Mr. Findlay, and myself, called upon you to inform you that his appointment would, on political grounds, be unacceptable to the republicans of the district, and that we would feel it to be our duty to resist its confirmation by the Senate.

The circumstance of the letter from Gen. Jackson, was spoken of by my colleague and myself, to several members of the Senate, whilst the question was pending before that body. On my return to my constituents, the appointment was, of course, the subject of conversation. It had been the cause of much excitement, and an opinion was freely expressed, that in making it, the wishes of the republicans of the district had been disregarded.

You will perceive, sir, the very unpleasant situation in which I have been placed by circumstances over which I have had no control; and it is manifest that, in the determination of this affair, my character, which I trust I value as I ought, and which is to be the chief inheritance of my children, is deeply involved.
